His Majesty desires to say he has joyfully accepted the invitation to attend the grand Royal Ball to be given in his honor, and is very anxious for the day of his arrival when he will greet once more his faithful subjects and his beautiful Queen.

His Majesty ordains that the weather be propitious during his sojourn in Thibodaux in order that those who gather to do honor and greet his Royal Highness be able to devote themselves to uninterrupted pleasures.

"SUCROSE," King of the Carnival M. FARTTELINI, Duke of Lafourche, Grand High Chamberlain.

Proclamation. City Hall, Thibodaux, La. Greeting—All faithful subjects of King Sucrose having manifested their desire that in order to attest their loyalty and to suitably honor the august presence of our well-beloved sovereign, King Sucrose, on the occasion of his second triumphant entry into our capital city, on Tuesday, February 19th, 1901.

Now, therefore, I, F. ZERNOTT Mayor of the City of Thibodaux, do hereby ordain and decree that said day be set apart as a public holiday, all public buildings, places of business and schools be closed, and that said day be one of rejoicing and merriment.

CASTORIA. The Kid You Have Always Bought. For the lowlands of Mississippi, Louisiana and Florida, where mosquitoes abound, will be invaluable in learning of a remedy, said to be infallible, against these insects of the tropics.

Experiments with the castor oil plant, it has been ascertained, where these plants are planted few mosquitoes can be found. It seems that the essential oil of the plant is disagreeable to mosquitoes and other insects. The castor plant palma christi, is of perennial growth, and in some tropical countries attains a great height. The medicinal properties of the plant are the subject of a special report by United States Consul General at Maracaibo, South America, whose experiments with the plant have been productive of the happiest results. There are several varieties of the castor plant. Those experimented with were brown and white, the former tasting like that of the black almond.

It is possible that the Agricultural Department will be overruled with respect to these mosquito killers. Democrat.

Jury Venire.

THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, THE STATE OF LOUISIANA, PARISH OF LAFOURCHE.

BE IT KNOWN AND REMEMBERED, That on this 31st day of the month of January, in the year our Lord, One thousand nine hundred and one.

Persons to be written notices issued by the Clerk of Court, in and for the parish of Lafourche, and addressed and given to each of the Jury Commissioners in and for said Parish, as by the said Clerk's certificate hereto annexed more fully, to-wit: Charles J. Barker, Clerk, H. W. Frost, Henry Riviere, a majority of the Jury Commissioners appointed as such for the parish of Lafourche under the provisions of Act No. 135 of the General Assembly, approved July 13th, 1895, and promulgated by publication in the State official journal on July 28, 1895, and all duly sworn and qualified as such Jury Commissioners in and for the said parish of Lafourche; met at the clerk's Office at the Court House in the town of Thibodaux and in company with Charles J. Barker, Clerk of said Court, ex-officio Jury Commissioner, duly qualified and sworn as such, then and there, in the presence of Messrs. J. O. Knobloch and E. J. Legendre, his competent and distinguished witnesses of lawful age, competent to read and write the English language, residing in the parish of Lafourche, and summoned by the Clerk of Court, for the purpose; proceeded in accordance with Section 6 of said Act No. 135 of the General Assembly of Louisiana of 1895, to examine the original venire list on file in the Clerk's office, and having struck therefrom the names of such grand jurors and regular jurors as have so served, as well as the names of others who are known to have died, removed from the Parish, become exempt or disqualified to serve as jurors, since their names were entered thereon; and the names of those who have died, removed, become exempt or disqualified were also taken from the general venire box; after which we supplemented the original list and the ballots in the box with the names of the same number of good and competent men from the qualified jurors of the Parish, as have been taken from the box and erased from the list, so as to keep the number of names in the general venire box and on the jury list as the original standard of three hundred contained therein; each of said name so placed in the general venire box having been written by the said Clerk on a separate slip of paper, together with the number of the ward, or place of residence, of such person.

And immediately after completing said general venire list, we selected therefrom the names of the following twenty citizens, good and competent men, possessing the qualifications set forth in the general venire box, and serve as grand jurors prescribed by Section 1 of said Act, taken from different parts of the Parish, as far as practicable, to serve as grand jurors at the session of court beginning on Monday, March, 11th, 1901, and until discharged according to law, to-wit:

ORDINANCE NO.

WHEREAS a controversy has arisen between the parish authorities and the heirs of FERDINAND BARILLEAUX as to the right of the parish to take from the said heirs a new road in front of their lands situated in this parish on the right descending bank of the bayou LAFOURCHE and just below the village of LOCKPORT, and whereas the said controversy has been heard and compromised, by the opposing parties by mutual concessions by the opening of the road as it is now located and the agreement to pay therefor the sum of ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS by the LOCKPORT BRIDGE COMPANY;

And whereas the road as so established on the upper line of the property of the said heirs is not quite as wide as the general rules and ordinances of the parish require, being infringed upon to a very slight extent by the gallery or shed in front of the store building at the corner on the said upper line;

BE IT ORDAINED, that for the purpose of putting of record the said agreement, it is declared that the said shed is now established at that point and the right of the said heirs of the said FERDINAND BARILLEAUX to retain the said gallery and store as now established is hereby fully recognized, in favor of them and their assigns, under the said agreement and compromise.
