MAD DOG RUNS AMUCK

Bit One Woman and Many Dogs and Cattle.

Most of the Latter Killed at Once and the Human Victim Sent to Baltimore, Where She Makes the Fifth Louisiana Patient This Year.

A special dispatch from Lockport to the Times Democrat, dated April 8, says:

Mrs. James Toups, residing on McCloud plantation, was bitten by a mad dog at an early hour Friday morning last. The dog made his escape, but other dogs on the plantation and on its way down the bayou fought every dog encountered for a distance of nine miles.

On the Ludvine plantation, where it was finally killed, a number of cattle, horses and dogs were bitten.

Indications point so strongly to the dog having hydrophobia that Mrs. Toups was advised by her family physician to go to Baltimore and undergo a course of treatment at the Pasteur Institute.

She left this morning, accompanied by Sidney Bourg, carrying with him the head of the dog for the purpose of proving whether or not the dog was affected with hydrophobia.

All the dogs on the Mc. Cloud plantation, where Mrs. James Toups was bitten, have been killed. Ben Toups, manager of the plantation, began by killing his own dog and a general slaughter of dogs followed.

Orders have been issued that all the dogs on the Ravenwood, Chlotilda and other plantations be killed. The cattle, horses and other animals bitten on the Ludvine plantation have been isolated from the rest of the stock.

THE DOG WAS MAD

New Test Used at Baltimore in the Toups Case.

Microscopic Examination of Ganglia Establishes the Diagnosis.

Special to The Times-Democrat. Baltimore, Md., April 11.—A new method for determining quickly whether a dog has rabies has been successfully tested at the Pasteur Department College of Physicians and Surgeons in the case of Mrs. James Toups of Lockport, Lafourche parish, La.

Dr. N. G. Keirle, director of the department, to-day announced that as a result of the test he was satisfied the dog had rabies. The practical advantages of this new method are very well shown in the case of Mrs. Toups. She was bitten last Friday and arrived Monday in Baltimore with the head of the dog. On Tuesday Dr. Keirle began the new test and today, six days after she was bitten, was able to tell Mrs. Toups that it was more than probable that the dog which bit her was mad.

By the method of trephining rabbits heretofore exclusively used, from two to three weeks would have been required. Frequently there are persons who wish proof that the dog was mad before consenting to undergo the Pasteur treatment. With rabbits such a course would have been suicidal, as the disease would have developed in the human system too far to have been counteracted. With the new test such assurances can be given within forty-eight hours after the dog is received. Dr. Keirle, however, is not fully convinced of the absolute infallibility of the new method and will still continue to trephine rabbits to determine the existence of rabies. The new method is the discovery of Dr. N. V. Babes, Bucharest, Roumania.

It consists of an examination under a microscope of a portion of the medulla oblongata of the animal when well defined changes in the nervous tissues are apparent showing the ravages of disease there. Similar tissue changes have been noticed as a result of diphtheria and of various poisons, but in case of a dog that has savagely attacked someone the chances of the disease being anything but rabies are very remote.

About two days are required to prepare the tissues for examination on microscopic slides. Two other European physicians, Van Gehechten and Nells, have observed that ganglia of the nerve centres of the spine have similar tissue changes. Dr. Keirle would have liked to have tested this also in the case of Mrs. Toups but the head of the dog sent with her was cut off so close to the neck that nothing of the spine was left. This is the case with most of the dog heads brought to him, but he will try to secure some of the spine with the head. Mrs. Toups is doing very well. She has received two injections of serum daily since her arrival on Monday.

Notice is hereby given that in accordance with a regulation adopted by the State Board of Education, there will be, in the Town of Thibodaux, at the court house, an examination of white applicants for certificates to teach in the public schools of this parish, on Thursday, the 11th, and Friday, the 12th, of April, and of colored applicants on Friday, the 12th, of April. No other examination will be held until October of the present year. The certificates to be obtained by these tests will be of the first, second and third grade, and will be upon the branches of knowledge enumerated in Sections 47, 48 and 49 of Act 81, Session of 1888, and, in addition to these, on pedagogy, school government, and the evil effects of alcohol and narcotics upon the human system. One set of questions will be submitted as tests for certificates of the first and second grades; eighty per cent of correct answers being required for a first grade certificate and seventy per cent for a second grade certificate. The Elements of Pedagogy and School Management by Emerson E. White are commended to those who intend to compete.
