A committee was appointed to secure a site for the location of the plant. We understand that Mr. Nicholls has expressed his willingness to sell the Board of Directors a few acres of land, as a site for the plant, near the railroad at the head of Jackson street, on very reasonable terms.

We are glad to know that the men at the head of this movement are in earnest and mean business pure and simple. That the Moss Ginney is now a sure thing is an undisputed fact. The promoters of this work have been very zealous and faithful in the discharge of their duties. All honor and praise to the men who are going to give to Thibodaux a factory which will be of immense good to the community. State News.

The Police Jury of Webster parish has fixed the license for the sale of whiskey for the year 1902 at \$2,500.

The Police Jury of the Parish of Natchitoches is considering bids for the erection of a first class modern jail.

Lastic Pribeau was killed in Jennings last Wednesday by another negro because he refused to give the other negro a drink.

The new commander at the Jackson barracks is Lieutenant Colonel William P. Vose. He has recently returned from the Philippines Islands.

John P. Robertson a very prominent rice planter living near abbeville disappeared mysteriously last week and nothing has been heard of him since.

A store and post office was destroyed by fire in the little village of Elmer in Rapides parish this week by fire. The property destroyed was covered with an insurance of \$3,000.

The people of Lake Providence recently voted \$20,000 for the construction of a complete water works and electric light system. The water works are expected to be in operation by the 1st of next May.

A fire occurred in Morgan City a few days ago which destroyed a bakery and several small dwellings causing a loss of about \$5,000. The fire originated in the bakery from a lamp.

On last Wednesday morning in the town of Opelousas, Judge Estelle was thrown from his buggy and seriously injured. His collar bone was broken and very badly bruised up. He is doing well and will soon recover.

Mrs. Libbie Merritt in a suit of \$10,000 damages against the Victor Lumber company, for the killing of her husband by a piece of timber was awarded \$5,000 damages in the district court sitting in Shreveport this week.

The sugar house on Ida plantation, the property of Mr. Taylor Himel was destroyed by fire this week. The mill was located a few miles from Napoleonville, being the only one in that community. The loss is estimated at \$50,000 covered with an insurance of \$25,000.

Vincent Sylverre, a youth employed on the Paydras plantation met with an accident on last Monday afternoon while passing between two freight cars. He rested his foot on the coupling pin just as the cars were moved and his foot was very badly crushed.

Ed. Rudeley, a negro was killed on last Tuesday evening by James Hill a young man whose home is near Nabor ton in Desoto parish. It seems that the negro tried to kill young Hill with a cane knife and Hill shot him killing him instantly. The Coroner's jury completely exonerated Hill.

On last Friday morning the boiler of the Rayne ginning company exploded but did no serious damage. Mr. Chappuis the president and general manager of the plant telegraphed for a new boiler and it will not be long before every thing will be in running order.

A terrible accident happened in the settlement known as Lower Texas back of little Texas Plantation about ten miles from Napoleonville. While Mrs. Orille Landry went out to the front gate to purchase some articles from a peddler her home caught on fire and three of her children perished in the flames.

The city council of Baton Rouge decided at its last meeting this week to asphalt the Boulevard from Lafayette street at the northern entrance of the capitol to the Governor's mansion, and Main street from Lafayette to St. Anthony. The first coat of asphalt was put on Third street last

THEY SAY

Every body in Louisiana is interested in all improvements going on in the "Red Stick" city.

A murder was committed at Pickering, La. a saw mill town about twelve miles from Leesville, by a negro woman who called herself Carrie Nation. The victim was a white man named Cox and was employed as a block setter at the mill. Much indignation was aroused over the killing.

A difficulty occurred at Noble in the parish of Sabine in which Walter Rivers was killed and John Wall badly wounded by some showmen who left town before the authorities were aware of the trouble. The sheriff however, is in pursuit of the persons who are supposed to have done the shooting.

A white man by the name of Thibodaux while unloading rice in the town of St. Martinsville, from a wagon met with quite a serious accident. It seems that he was standing with one foot on the wheel and the other on the body of the cart and in some way lost his balance falling and breaking his arm and receiving painful bruises about the shoulders.

Joseph E. Smith was tried in the District Court sitting in the city of Alexandria last week for murder of Lizzie Calcote in a house of prostitution. Smith is a very bright young man and holds from Monroe. He set up the plea of self defense, but the jury had too high a regard for their solemn oaths and returned a verdict of manslaughter against the young man.

Last Sunday morning the little town of Many the county seat of Sabine parish was thrown in a state of excitement by the escaping of a number of prisoners from the parish prison. The delivery was effected by removing the bricks under the second story window and sliding down on blankets. The fugitives made good their escape.

At a special meeting of the Town Council held last Wednesday, a franchise was given to the Thibodaux electric car company, permitting them to operate electric cars through streets of our town, which streets will hereafter be designated by the Council. There is no doubt but that the Board of Aldermen have the authority to grant such franchises. The late decision in the Wyler case, applies to Police Jury franchises, but the authority to grant these privileges is given the Council by Act No. 136 of 1898, Section 15, Paragraph 6.—Terrebonne Times.

Joseph Johnston a white man was killed on last Sunday morning near Olla, La. on the Iron Mountain Railroad about fifty miles from Alexandria, by Jessie Ruddle the town Marshal. It seems that Johnston was under the influence of liquor and was trying to paint the town red, and when the town marshal attempted to put him under arrest he resisted and they both clinched and Ruddle shot and killed Johnston while in each others arms on the ground. Ruddle immediately surrendered to the sheriff Johnson was employed in a Large Lumber Co. He leaves a wife and small child to mourn his loss.

A new bank has been organized in the town of Natchitoches this week with the following officers: L. Caspari, president; H. M. Hysms, first vice-president; J. W. Freeman, second vice president, and S. H. Hill, cashier. The directors are: C. E. Greneaux, H. M. Hysms, Julius Aaron, E. M. Levy, G. J. Cook, John M. Tucker, Sam Nelkin, L. Caspari and J. W. Freeman. It will be known as the People's Bank, and will begin with a capital stock of \$50,000, of which \$20,000 is fully paid up, and will open for business on Jan. 1 next. The subscribers to the stock number about seventy and embrace all professions and callings. A building was leased to day and the contract let for a vault.
