### Are You Qualified?

Under the new law no one except qualified electors can be candidates for office; a qualified elector, as our readers know, is one who is qualified to vote—that is, who is registered and holds his poll tax receipts for two consecutive years prior to the time offering to vote. One can have paid the poll tax anywhere in the State, but must have resided in the State two years and parish one year before offering to vote. If a person has actually lived and paid his poll tax in a parish for one year, some lawyers assert that, according to the law, he is a legal resident of that parish.

Therefore, any elector who has resided in the parish one year before he becomes a bona fide resident, eligible to hold office in the last parish. However that may be, it is certain no person can hold office who is not a duly qualified elector. This applies to all alike, from the ward constable to Governor.—Opelousas Courier.

### For Representative.

Passed The House, Hung Up In The Senate. This is told in a line the history of Mr. Roosevelt's Cuban Reciprocity Tariff bill in the present extra session of Congress.

It was railroaded through the house by a big majority, there being only 21 votes against it.

Congressman Broussard made a magnificent speech against the measure, in which he demonstrated that the reduction made in the tariff rate on sugar would benefit the Sugar Trust and not the American consumer nor the Cuban producer, and ruin the American cane growers; but his speech could have no effect on men whose minds were already stubbornly made up.

In the Senate the influence of the administration and of the Republican leaders of the house tried to force the measure through but the Senators resented the interference and determined to postpone a vote on it until the regular session.

There is now very little hope that it will not be passed then; so our planters may as well prepare for the worst.
