Senator Foster's Return.

We reproduce from last Thursday's Picayune:

United States Senator Murphy J. Foster arrived in the city yesterday from Washington. He was met by a number of friends yesterday and talked over the session and the campaign in this State. He said that his health, which was quite poor when he started for Washington, had greatly improved, and he was feeling very well at present. He believed that the Cuban Reciprocity Bill would come to a final vote on Dec. 16, as agreed to, and said that there was no doubt about its passage through that body. The treaty will go into effect in ten days after its passage, and Cuban sugar can then begin to come in under the reduced duty.

Regarding the Panama treaty, Senator Foster was not inclined to say very much at present. He said that it was known that the treaty had been signed and sent to Panama, but that so far there was no government organized there qualified to ratify the treaty, and he was doubtful about the plans reported of having it ratified by mass meetings of the people.

No one knows what is in the treaty except by general report, so that it is impossible to discuss it. In such cases assurances are generally obtained that a treaty will be ratified, and no doubt such assurances have been given in this case. Senator Foster said that after the Monroe speech on Saturday he would deliver others, but the dates and places had not yet been arranged. He could not say for certain whether he would speak in this city during the period before his return to Washington, but it is very likely that he will do so.
