While there has been much said pro and con on the question of immigration here from foreign countries it remains nevertheless a fact that Louisiana is badly in need of help of all kinds and never before has the situation been near as serious.

That the Northern States have been more fortunate in getting immigration, is a settled fact but why such a condition should exist when the South is ready to receive with open arms all immigrants who are ready to work, is not so easy to understand. Mr. Reginald Dykers, Secretary and Treasurer of the Louisiana Immigration Association, writes the following open letter to the Picayune:

A significant fact concerning immigration to the South is that while crowds of alien laborers are now thronging the outgoing steamers at New York, returning to Europe because they can find no work in the North the immigrants arriving on the ships of the Austro-American Line at New Orleans are being snatched up eagerly and put to work, and the demand far exceeds the supply. No more forcible illustration could possibly be had of the wisdom of immigrants ships running to this port rather than to the Northern ports I believe notable contrast were given publicity all over the country through the Associated Press it would material assist us in our efforts to get the tide of immigration directed this way.
