### Grief in Germany.

The social and domestic misery produced in Germany by the war is very great. A German paper states that in the provinces of Westphalia, at the beginning of October, there were 11,817 married women, the wives and widows of soldiers, together with 22,713 children obtaining relief from the public funds. In Hanover, 9624 women and 26,418 children were dependent upon the public for support. In the Rhenish provinces there were 13,312 married women and 29,619 fatherless children who were utterly destitute. Thus, in only three Prussian provinces there were, last October, 35,750 women and 78,750 children in a condition of misery and want, and it is believed that destitution to the same extent prevails in the other provinces of Prussia. The price of provisions is extraordinarily high, and the winter, it is predicted, will be unusually severe. The injury done by the potato rot and the rinderpest has also been severe, and the condition of families of the peasants left at home is very miserable. About nine-tenths of the males are in the landwehr, and the women and children thus deprived of their natural supporters will, it is feared, perish from starvation.

Beecher took strong ground in his Thanksgiving sermon in favor of "the heathen Chinese." "We wanted labor," he said, "and, therefore, God bless the Dane, the German, the Swede, and all who will come; and God bless a little more the Chinaman, because he needs a little more."
