The Prussians Pillaging.

England Indignant.

Manteuffel Hunting the French.

Cotton Quiet and Weak.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27.—The following is a summary of back news: "King William reports that Manteuffel gained a victory near Amiens, capturing 1000 prisoners. No more fighting at Paris."

BORDEAUX, Dec. 27.—A dispatch from Poitiers says 10,000 Prussians, with artillery, occupy Blois, and have pillaged indiscriminately public and private houses.

There are 20,000 Prussians at Orleans, where the officers and privates are all plundering.

There is no news from the Army of the Loire.

LONDON Dec. 27.—The sinking of six English ships in the Seine, by the Prussians, for the purpose of obstructing navigation, has occasioned great indignation throughout England.

Mezieres is surrounded by 15,000 Prussians, and a siege is imminent.

The following is the latest from Versailles: The forts continue to waste ammunition by inefficient cannonades.

Manteuffel continues the active pursuit of the Army of the North. We captured some prisoners at Albert.

LONDON, Dec. 27.—Noon.—Consols 91; bonds 88½.

LIVERPOOL, Dec. 27.—Cotton opened quiet; Uplands 8½d., Orleans 8½; sales 1200 bales.

NEW YORK, Dec. 27.—Stocks quiet; government bonds steady but very dull; State bonds steady but dull. Gold dull 110½; money 7; sterling, long, 9½; short 10. Cotton quiet and weak; sales 1500 bales; Uplands 15½.

The Ouachita Belle, Capt. Blanks's new boat, made our landing Friday night. She is one of the best-built and most complete steamboats ever brought up the Ouachita. Her accommodations are almost luxurious, and her rate of speed not surpassed by any craft of similar appointments. She will be our regular Saturday New Orleans packet.

The regular daily trains on the railroad will be suspended for a season, and will be replaced by trains eastward on Mondays, Wednesday and Fridays, returning on succeeding days. This change is necessitated by the inefficiency of the engines now used.

Superintendent Green leaves for the North, on Monday, to purchase new engine, upon the receipt of which daily trains will be resumed.

The mercury sank to 18° on Saturday. Some of our friends report that they had fine skating in the ponds above town, something very unusual in this latitude. Mercury, to-day, 50°, with a drizzling rain.

The Methodist Fair closed Saturday night, with very satisfactory results.—Several hundred dollars worth of merchandise remain on hand, which is yet to be sold.
