Conference on the Eastern Question a Failure!

The French on the Offensive!

Sufferings and Death of German Wounded.

Another German Insult to England.

LONDON, Dec. 30.—The fleet bearing the Spanish King was signaled off Barcelona, and will reach Carthagena today.

It is believed that the Spanish government will withdraw the bill to suspend the Constitutional guarantees.

The government commenced disbanding the Republican battalions of the National Guard.

LONDON, Dec. 30.—The conference on the Eastern question is indefinitely postponed, France having refused to take any part. Her absence renders the meeting useless.

LILLE, Dec. 30.—Bourbaki and Chanse have resumed the offensive.

The Uhlans are scouring the country between Donai, Cambrai and Arras.

CHERBOURG, Dec. 30.—A large number of troops are arriving to be drilled.

DRESDEN, Dec. 30.—The Crown Prince of Saxony telegraphs to King John that when his troops entered Mont Avron they found the works deserted, the French having removed the guns.

The French subsequently withdrew from the village of Rosney, on the road to Paris.

LONDON, Dec. 31.—The weather is intensely cold, and causes a fearful mortality among the German wounded.—Nearly all the occupants of the 56 carriages of wounded at Belfort, on the 21st, were frozen dead before the train reached Chalenouich.

A dispatch from Besancon reports another unsuccessful assault upon Belfort, the besiegers losing 1400 killed and wounded.

A dispatch from Havre says the Germans captured another English collier at Rouen and sunk the vessel in the Seine.

PITTSBURG, Dec. 31.—The Marshal House, at Franklin, Pennsylvania, was burned, and communicated fire to the wire bridge over the Allegheny. The heated wire gave way and the bridge fell, fatally wounding many and seriously injuring twenty persons on the bridge when it fell. Weather intensely cold and made rescues hazardous.

NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—Gold very steady at 110½; money 7; sterling, long 9; short 9½; cotton quiet and steady; sales 1500 bales; uplands 15½.
