Orville Grant to Gen. Grant.

Gen. Schenck Resigns.

French Invasion of Germany!

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—The Cincinnati Commercial publishes a letter from Orville Grant, to the President, charging Gen. Bloomfield, Supervisor of Illinois, with connivance at fraud.

Orville Grant admits he was approached in confidence with corrupt propositions, both regarding whisky frauds and the Cuban recognition. He says:

"I have gained my knowledge of the whole affair in the strictest confidence. The only apology I can make for doing a man so great an injustice, is that my duty to you is stronger than my word, or confidence to one who is instrumental in defrauding the Government and ruining your reputation; for all the frauds of your appointees fall upon you and the party."

Orth has been appointed a member of the Committee of Ways and Means.

LANSING, MICH., Jan. 5.—The Republican caucus nominated Terry for Senator, which is equivalent to an election.

LAWRENCE, Kansas, Jan. 5.—A fire is progressing; loss already \$50,000.

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—The Telegram's special from London, 5th, says: A dispatch from Havre, dated 3rd, reports Bourbaki marching on Germany, and Chansey at Lemans constantly pushing ahead the flying columns.

There are 10,000 troops marching towards Paris, via Chartres.

Garibaldi, at Dijon, is doing little.

Faiderherbe, at Barras, is preparing to attack Manteufel, probably with the intention of joining Bourbaki.

There are 16,000 troops in Havre, and 20,000 at Belbec, inclusive of the Franc Tireurs, cavalry and regulars. A forward movement has commenced today.
