The trial, in the U. S. Circuit Court, of the case of Hollingsworth vs. the Parish of Tensas, was concluded yesterday. This is a suit for damages, actual and consequential, caused by the construction of a levee in the rear of plaintiff's plantation, situated on the Mississippi river, in Tensas parish. In his charge to the jury, Judge Boardman said that the act of the Police Jury was an exercise of the right of eminent domain, and that the plaintiff, therefore, was entitled to recover the actual damages shown to have been sustained by her, but that she could not recover consequential damages, unless the proof showed that the defendant had acted wantonly and negligently in the exercise of its power. The Jury returned a verdict of non-suit as to the actual damages, but in favor of the defendant for the consequential damages claimed by plaintiff. We understand that the case will be carried to the U. S. Supreme Court on writ of error.

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
