The U. S. District court, after a session of one week, stood adjourned without day this morning. Although the session was short, a great deal of work has been accomplished and several cases, both civil and criminal, of more than usual interest and importance have been tried.

The Grand Jury made their final report yesterday and were discharged. 52 cases were examined, 18 bills found and 34 ignored.


