The Race.

The 400-yard race between the Louisiana pony and the Texas mare which was to have come off Saturday, for \$150 a side failed to reach a decision. Two false starts were made, the pony running through each time at nearly full speed, and it was agreed to postpone the race until 4 o'clock this afternoon. Odds of feet, or money were offered, without takers, on the mare. A large crowd attended the projected trial of speed, most of whom were disappointed at the result. The "word" will be given this afternoon, not by either rider, but by a disinterested judge, and it is said there will be no postponement. As one result of the race, horse-talk has become a staple theme of conversation and an increasing interest shown in fine stock.

P. S.—The "Lone Star" mare won the race, as judged by 52 feet, having 20 feet the start and coming out ahead 72 feet.

City Recorder's Court.

The following cases were before this Court this morning, in one of which we had an indirect interest, from the fact that one of the fights occurred on premises owned by us, but rented to the parties in dispute and we desire here to thank our confere of the Bulle-

tin for the decision rendered, the case in question, being:

Osbon Phillips, (col.) fighting and disturbing the peace, fined \$100, and costs amounting to \$2.50.

He beat his wife in a brutal manner, inflicting wounds that are both serious and dangerous in their nature, and the "cooler" will teach him a lesson that he has failed to learn.

Ellen Smith and Milley Frazer (col.) fighting and disturbing the peace, fined \$10, and costs, \$2.50 each.

Jane Young, same offense, fined \$15 and costs, which amounted to \$2.50.

Joe Boatner, who "bucked the tiger," too lively, and allowed himself to imagine that the sidewalks were owned by him, was discharged, his previous good behavior and conduct being in his favor.

O. Lewis and R. Johnson, violating side walk ordinance \$5.00 and costs each.

U. S. District Court.

This court adjourned *sine die* Saturday, the last case decided, or rather not decided, being that of Batchelor Co. vs. Gerson; Brunner & Hoffman, intervenors. The point at issue was as to the ownership of the goods in the possession of the intervenors. Six of the jury held that the sale to intervenors, of the goods attached, by Gerson, was a *bona fide* transaction, while the remaining five, only eleven jurors by consent composing the jury, maintained that the sale was simulated and fraudulent.

In the matter of the receivership of the Shreveport and Houston railroad, it was agreed to have the case argued and decided in chambers at Shreveport.

The next term of the Court here will be in April next.
