Blizzard at New York.

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—A northwest blizzard struck this city about half past one o'clock this morning. Ten minutes before that hour the sky was perfectly clear and the weather tranquil with thermometer at about the freezing point. The wind, which blew at the rate of 50 miles per hour was accompanied by a blinding snow fall. The thermometer ran down quickly into the 20's and though the snow soon abated the wind continued very high. The telegraph wires, which have suffered considerably, advised us of the nearer and nearer approach of the hurricane.

Light-house Keeper recovers.

A Dispatch from Boston says that Capt. Martin, the keeper of Minot's Ledge, light house, was able to leave his post yesterday for first time since the great storm of last week. The storm was surpassed in violence only by the great one of 1851, when the first Minot's Ledge light house was carried away. No other light house in the world, so exposed to the mercy of the sea and winds, a pinnacle of structure towers, nearly 200 feet above the waves could have withstood the storm and yet the tremendous seas last week dashed fifty feet above the peak.

Jailed.

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—Ex-policeman Kennedy, of Brooklyn, who escaped from Jail July, 13, directly after his conviction for betraying Miss Martha H. Wood, under a promise marriage, is back in jail in that city. The Sheriff found Kennedy in Montreal and latter upon learning that the Sheriff would be responsible for many thousands of dollars, because of his escape, he voluntarily returned to suffer, as he said, for a crime which he never committed, rather than have the Sheriff put to any loss.

Will Die.

Conductor Meyers, of the Brooklyn bridge cars who was injured in the accident of Saturday last will probably die. The others injured are doing well. The accident did not decrease car traffic Saturday. There were more than 60,000 car passengers on that day. The bridge engineers think that the wheels of the train were brought to a standstill but that the second train slid down wet tracks on a steep grade into the collision. They assert that if the brakes on the second train had not been worked at all there would have been a great loss life.

A Fund.

The fund to send to Paris the children, recently bitten by a mad dog in Newark, N. J., has reached over \$700. Congressman Hewitt is a subscriber

and takes much interest in the case. Andrew Carnegies offer, to send a scientific man along with the children, has been declined.

The Burmese People Talk and Fight.

ROGOON, Dec. 7.—The Chamber of Commerce here, has repeated its request to the Government to annex Burmah, in accordance with the wishes of Burmese people and protests that another Burmese Ruler would lead to endless trouble.

In a brisk encounter between 218 British soldiers and 1000 Burmese soldiers on Wednesday, at Nyadon, three British and 60 Burmese were killed and 150 wounded.

Public Health Association.

WASHINGTON, D. C. Dec. 7.—Delegates to the American Public Health Association, which meets here next week are already here in large numbers. The association is composed of representatives of the various State Boards of Health and leading physicians from all parts of the country. The principal subject of discussion will be the proper organization of Health Boards and local sanitary movements in connection with the object of the exclusion and suppression epidemics.

Violating the Excise Law.

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—About 50 arrests were made yesterday for violation of the Excise Law. A sergeant of police in the up town precincts, said that the exercise business was getting very tiresome. The police kept piling up cases, but none of them came up for trial.

FOREIGN.

MADRID, December. 7.—The Official Gazette, publishes a note from Queen Regent, in which she offers her thanks to the army for its profession of regret at the death of King Alfonso, and for its loyalty to the Throne.

The Republican papers violently denounce the Pope for favoring the project to marry Young Queen Mercedes to the son of Don Carlos.

MADRID, Spain Dec. 7.—Dr. Camison Royal Physician, will publish a pamphlet on the nature of the illness of King Alfonso.

BERLIN, Dec. 7.—The census of the city completed December, 1st., shows the population of Berlin to be 1,316,382.

It has been appropriately suggested that while Congress is making a more explicit law to provide for the Presidential succession, it should also take up the question of determining how a disputed Presidential election is to be decided. An experience like that of 1876 still menaces the country.
