for the 23d., Senatorial District, I hereby direct that a Convention of delegates to be chosen by the aforesaid parishes for the nomination of two Senators for the 23d., Senatorial District, be held in the city of Monroe on Wednesday, February the 10th., and that the vote cast for President Cleveland be the basis of representation in said Convention, allowing one delegate for each one hundred votes and one for each fraction over fifty votes so cast entitling each parish to the following representation to wit:

Ouachita parish 1896 votes, 19 delegates; Richland 773 votes, 8 delegates; Caldwell 659 votes, 7 delegates; Franklin 765 votes, 8 delegates; Jackson 659 votes, 7 delegates.

I respectfully request that the newspapers of the District publish this notice and suggest that the Executive Committees of the different parishes assemble immediately and provide for the election of delegates.
