The American Porker.

WASHINGTON, March 20.—The secretary of state received a communication from the consul-general of the United States at Berlin which states that within the last few weeks not less than thirty to forty cases of trichinosis has been discovered in Zutlichan a town in Sillsa and vicinity. Similar cases, the consul-general says are reported from time to time from other places in Germany, showing that the theory which led to the prohibition law of American hogs has received a setback by facts which cannot be denied.

Fraudulent Importation of Cattle.

The treasury department has received a report from Special Agent Jerome in regard to the alleged fraudulent importation to cattle from Mexico. He says that calves are taken in large numbers from Texas into Mexico, where they are kept for several years, and then returned as being cattle. In this way he says great frauds are perpetrated which can only be prevented by extra vigilance on the border. Instructions have been sent to those officers to guard against any violation of the custom laws in this respect.

Dismissed The Petition.

The house committee on elections yesterday dismissed the petition asking the members of congress from California be unseated on the ground that the State had been re-apportioned, and that the members did not reside within their congressional districts.

Funeral of Hon. Michael Hahn.

NEW ORLEANS, March 20.—Yesterday morning the casket containing the remains of the late Hon. Michael Hahn were taken to the residence of his sister, Mrs. Urbane, from which the funeral took place this afternoon, Rev. John Percival, of the Free Church of the Annunciation officiating. The funeral was attended by large numbers, including many prominent citizens and business men. Flags on public buildings are at half mast in honor of the deceased congressman. The Republican state central committee of Louisiana, of which Gov. Hahn was a member, held a meeting yesterday, Gen. A. S. Badger presiding, and adopted resolutions of condolence, reciting that in the demise of Hon. Michael Hahn this committee loses and esteems and valuable member, the Republican party a brilliant and fearless champion and the people of Louisiana an able and patriotic representative, and his sisters a kind and devoted brother.

Eddisons Latest invention a Success.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., March 20.—An exhibition of the working of the

Edison system of telegraphing to and from moving trains by induction from roof of cars to wires, as giving yesterday on a special train by the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul road from Chicago to Milwaukee and return, was very successful. Sealed messages written by and addressed to passengers were sent by the Morse system from Chicago to a point where the condenser for the new system was placed and from there were telegraphed to the operator on the train running thirty-five miles per hour and delivered to the writers. Practical telegraphers and electricians were unanimous in pronouncing it a wonderful thing and something thought capable of great development.

The Eight Hour System.

CHICAGO, March 20.—The executive committee of the Eight-Hour association held a meeting Thursday night at the McCoy's hotel and elected a secretary. It directed the secretary to send a communication to the Citizens association asking for a reply to the pamphlet recently issued by the Eight-Hour association and distributed among employes and employers. The Central Labor union sent out a communication yesterday to a large number of employes. They contain a list of questions calculated to bring out the opinions of employes to whom they are sent and show his position in regard to the introduction of the eight-hour law.

Strike Ended.

The Daily News South Bend (Ind.) special says: The settlement of the Studebaker strike is about completed and work will be resumed Monday at a satisfactory adjustment of wages.

Business Failures for the Past Week.

NEW YORK, March 20.—The following are the business failures occurring throughout the country during the last seven days, as reported to R. G. Dun & Co.: Number for the United States, 190; Canada, 36, or a total of 225 as compared with 239 last week and 246 the week previous. Gradual decline in casualties in this country still continues, but in Canada failures seem to be on the increase.

Imports of Dry Goods.

NEW YORK, March 20.—The total imports of dry goods at this port during the past week were valued at \$2,872,607 and the amount thrown on the market at \$2,720,867.
