## Latest News.

### Must Leave.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 21.—A private telegram received in this city yesterday says all persons owning cattle in the Chickasaw Nation have been ordered out. This applies to aliens and not to natives of the Nation.

### Burned.

CINCINNATI, April 21.—A fire yesterday morning destroyed the flour mills of Bebles, Gould & Co., corner Race and Court streets. Loss \$50,000; fully insured. The building belongs to W. H. Aims, and is amply insured.

### Sentences Commuted.

FORT SMITH, Ark., April 21.—Death sentences of five of the eight Indian Territory murderers to have been hanged here Friday have been commuted to imprisonment for life in the Detroit house of correction.

### Regarded with Apprehension.

GALVESTON, April 21.—A special to the News from Texarkana says it has been discovered that within the past three weeks the Knights of Labor have organized several colored assemblies in the vicinity of Texarkana both in Arkansas and Texas. The movement is regarded with apprehension.

### Burned to Death.

ST. LOUIS, April 21.—Lena Ruth, a servant girl employed in the house of Henry Brewer, attempted yesterday to fill an oil stove with gasoline before extinguishing the burning wicks. The tank of the stove exploded, the girl's clothing caught fire and she was burned to death before her cries for help could be answered.

### Railroad Accident.

PITTSBURG, Pa., April 21.—A fast freight train going east over the West Pennsylvania railway ran into an open switch near Harmarsville, Pa., twenty miles east of this city about daylight yesterday morning and was precipitated over an embankment. The entire train was wrecked and the crew, consisting of Engineer McFarland, Fireman Ramley and Brakeman Matthews, seriously and perhaps fatally hurt.

### From Washington.

WASHINGTON, April 21.—The secretary of the treasury yesterday afternoon issued a call for \$10,000,000 three per cent bonds. The call will mature June 1.

The special committee to the House of Representatives to inquire into the labor troubles in the Southwest held its first public session yesterday. It consists of ex-Gov. Curtin, of Pennsylvania, chairman; Messrs. Burnes, of Missouri; Crain, of Texas; Outhwaite, of Ohio; Stewart, of Vermont; Parker, of New York, and Buchanan, of New Jersey. All the members were present except Mr. Stewart, who is absent by leave of the House. Among the prominent persons in attendance were: As representatives of the Knights of Labor T. V. Powderly, grand master workman; J. W. Hayes and Wm. O. McDowell, members of the executive board, and Frederick Turner, grand secretary; as representatives of the railroad interest, Wager Swaine, counsel, and as representative of the Women's League of America, Mrs. Charlotte Smith and three other ladies. A corps of stenographers was on hand to make a full report of the proceedings for the railroad companies.

### The New York Car Strike.

NEW YORK, April 21.—Commissioner O'Donnell said he was told that the Third Avenue company was running twenty-five cars yesterday. He also stated that Director Luterback, of that road, was willing to submit to arbitration and it was thought that this would lead to a settlement of the difficulty and that the cars of the company would all be running before nightfall.

The officials on the road refuse to bother with any more conferences before the railroad commissioners. They say they will fight to the bitter end now. The situation is hourly growing more critical; the men are becoming exasperated, but hope that the railroad commissioners will be able to arbitrate. They say the struggle is for life or death now and they are ready for peace or war.

Gen. Charles Hamlin, son of Hon. Hannibal Hamlin, denies the report that he had withdrawn as a candidate for Governor of Maine.

The river and harbor bill came up as unfinished business yesterday, and will occupy the attention of the House perhaps two days.
