## CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, May 20, 1886.  
Monroe, La.

The Council met upon a call of the Mayor.

Present—Fred Eadom, Mayor; D. C. Gibson, W. P. Renwick, T. N. Conner, Franklin Garrett, W. A. O'Kelly, Wm. Hoekins. Absent—Sandy Bird.  
The Mayor then explained the object of the meeting after which the following ordinance was adopted:

ORDINANCE No. 616.

Granting right of way through, across and along certain streets and the river front, to the Monroe Compress Company.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of Monroe: That the right to construct such railroad tracks as may be required to connect their contemplated works with the Vicksburg, Shreveport & Pacific railroad and to operate thereon cars propelled by steam or other motive power, be, and is hereby granted to The Monroe Cotton Compress and Warehouse Company, beginning at the lower line of the head of Pine street on the river front, thence along said river front across McGuire Avenue to the property of the said V. S. & P. railroad and across Grand and Walnut streets, connecting with said V. S. & P. railroad. Provided, cars and engines shall not moved along said tracks at a greater speed than six miles per hour and bells rung as required by law: that all necessary crossings, bridges, and other constructions made under this grant shall be approved by the Committee on Streets and Landings of the City of Monroe, and be kept by the grantees, at their own expense, in thorough good order and repair.

Provided further, That the construction of said tracks, etc., by the said Compress Company shall be an acceptance of the terms of this ordinance which shall then become a contract—and said Compress Company by such acceptance shall assume all responsibility and protect the City of Monroe from all rights of action by reason of damage to private or individual rights which may result from the exercise of the franchises herein granted or otherwise.
