The Teachers Institute.

The second Teachers Institute ever convened in the parish of Ouachita, was opened at Monroe yesterday in the Circuit Court room by Dr. Edward E. Shieb, Principal of the State Normal School at Natchitoches, assisted by Prof. William Waterbury of Iowa, J. T. Corlew and A. Reed of New York, and Miss Nettie Rousseau of the State Normal School.

There were present about one hundred persons, including, perhaps, twenty or twenty-five teachers. The entire faculty addressed the audience on their respective subjects as set forth in the published programme, making an impression that they are masters of the situation.

Prof. Waterbury opened with a very interesting talk on physiology, confining himself principally to the system of circulatory organs and the system of nerves, showing in a very lucid way how the blood circulates through the body, following it from the left heart to the arteries and on to the capillaries, distributing its life giving properties obtained from the digestive and respiratory systems, thence back to the right heart, and on through the lesser circulation to the lungs for purification—how the carbon of the blood combines with the oxygen of the air inhaled, producing carbonic acid gas and thereby developing the heat in the human body, and how this animal heat is actually burning up every nerve, muscle, and organ of the body like a burning candle, and how these parts destroyed are perpetually renewed by keeping the digestive system supplied with wholesome food—sending the blood back to the heart again prepared for another eventful voyage over the human system. It is remarkable with what rapidity he passed from one part of his discourse to another and all the time making every thing so plain that even the dullest minds might easily comprehend.

He was followed by Miss Rousseau, who is a perfect embodiment of grace, dignity and simplicity. She read an excellent and well prepared paper on the interesting subject of Primary Education. It was read in an easy flowing, graceful style and was well received by the people.

Next came Prof. Alonzo Reed, Instructor in English in the Brooklyn Collegiate and Polytechnic Institute. He addressed the audience in a few brief, but forcible remarks, on the subject of English grammar, stating that it is not so much the study of books and methods that makes grammarians, but the study of the subject under consideration itself, applying to the solution of vexed and disputed questions the rules and laws of nature, as the surest way of conducting ourselves from darkness into the true light of knowledge.

(He is the author of a splendid series of spellers and English grammars, which are now very generally regarded the best works of the kind in print).

Prof. Corlew followed with a spirited and well timed discourse on that delightful and ever entertaining subject Geography. It was marvelous with what skill and adroitness he handled his subject. He made a good impression and a larger audience is predicted for him to-morrow.

Dr. Shieb now came forward and spoke on the subject of the "growth and development of the mind." His perfect knowledge of the sciences of intellectual and moral philosophy, psychology and sociology so vividly portrayed in his talk to-day, proves conclusively that he is admirably prepared for Normal school work.

Prof. Waterbury closed the exercises of the day with a speech on discipline, in which he acquitted himself, if possible, more ably than at first, but the writer cannot agree in sentiment with him. He denies the right of corporal punishment in the school room in any form. In this he is not supported by a majority of pedagogues, which set forth the experience of our greatest educators.
