A VICE OF HIDEOUS MIEN.

A Senate committee of the legislature is now considering the wisdom of passing a bill through that body—the bill has already passed the other house—enforcing the compulsory observance of the Sabbath, so far as all business houses are concerned, the said houses to be closed at 12 o'clock Saturday night and to remain closed the ensuing 24 hours. Lest it may be inferred—as it naturally and logically would be—we should state that the proposed Act is for the benefit and christianization of the rural regions of the State alone. The city of New Orleans is already up to the Sunday standard, and therefore, is logically exempted, *eo nomine*, in the bill.

We have but a word or two of comment to make in respect of this Act. *Imprimis*, the mere closing of business houses will not enforce the observance of the Sabbath in any community where it is not the predominant sentiment and belief it should be observed. It will not do away with private clubs, fishing or hunting parties, horse-racing and numberless secret non-observances quite as reprehensible as the transaction of business on the Sabbath openly and under the scrutinizing gaze of the entire community. No one will deny but that even a pious regard and respect should be shown for the feelings of all who follow the teachings of our Savior, and there is, and there never can be a plainer or more binding Act in the great forum of conscience than that solemnly enacted by the Creator in the few words,

REMEMBER THE SABBATH DAY TO KEEP IT HOLY.

The purposes of the proposed Act meet with our hearty approval, however; but we are of the opinion strongly that they can be better and more appropriately accomplished by municipal laws, the authority being ample for that purpose.

But we wish to direct the attention of the legislature to a graver and more monstrous vice than the interchange of values on the Sabbath, and one which is an outrage not alone on the church and society, but upon every sentiment of man and womanhood and is a violation bold, unblushing and diabolical, upon the everlasting laws of nature human. Need we say that this towering blight and curse of the age and of our race is that of

MISCEGENATION?

This monstrosity in nature, daring and hideous, hardly seeks a hiding place or the shades of night, but even vaunts itself with almost undisguised and bodily presence in the sacred precincts of virtue and Caucasian pride of posterity.

Is there no member of the legislature, turning aside from meditations of laws of doubtful expediency, or good—doubtful, because never to be enforced—who will not assail the rankling, pestiferous curse we here point out? We need not elaborate, we need not illustrations, we need not examples and results: the whole State is inundated with them; so that no legislator or other individual can plead ignorance, or close his eyes even, if he were so base, to the existence and growing spread of this gigantic sin and shame.

The Crops.

We have favorable reports from all portions of the surrounding country as to the condition of the crops so far as it depends upon cultivation; but there is a general complaint of lice on the cotton, which otherwise is doing well and with more than average stands. The prevailing dry weather or just suits the young plant, nor has it as yet injured corn on the river, but has, we learn, materially retarded it in the hills where there has not been a good season, except in the southwestern portion of the parish, for more than six weeks. An inspection of the crops on Bayou DeSaird yesterday (Friday) from a buggy impresses us most favorably with their condition, though it was apparent that both corn and cotton are backward—the former yet hardly preparing to tassel, and the latter, though clean and growing, having only just been brought to a stand. It is, of course, too soon for predictions.
