The River.

The Mississippi at Natchez Tuesday, stood 41 feet and falling; at Vicksburg the decline had been 12 inches, an increase in the fall of 1 inches for the preceding 24 hours. At Cairo the gauge read 21 feet and the rivers falling; at Memphis the decline was 6 inches, and the gauge read 11 feet below high water mark. At Cincinnati there was but 12 feet of water, whereas the danger line there is exactly 60 feet, while at Monroe the Ouachita registered 26 feet above low water mark, with a river almost stationary.

CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

The following ordinance being introduced it was moved that the order of business be suspended to pass said ordinance which was duly carried.

ORDINANCE NO. 617.

An ordinance repealing Ordinance No. 593, adopted April 13th, 1885, and apportioning the moneys received from the City Recorder.

1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of Monroe: That Ordinance No. 593, adopted April 13th, 1885, be and the same is hereby repealed.

2. Be it further ordained, That the monies hereafter received from the City Recorder for account of fines, etc., collected by him, shall be apportioned by the Treasurer as follows, to wit: One-half to the General Fund and the other half to the School Fund.

3. Be it further ordained that out of the amount apportioned under section 2 of this ordinance to the General Fund there shall be paid by preference each month the cost of feeding prisoners under charge of the city authorities.

The petition of W. R. Manning asking relief of fine imposed on him was read and relief granted as prayed for. Also a petition of Charles Hotten asking that his fine be reduced one-half and costs was read and granted.

Resolved, That the sum of \$70.00 charged on tax rolls for 1882, '83, '84 and '85, against Mrs. M. M. Calderwood, be remitted in consideration of
