THE GRAIN TRADE OF THE WEST TO FIND A WAY TO THE SEA VIA NEW ORLEANS INSTEAD OF NEW YORK.

It is just three years since the TIMES, in an article headed "The Gulf to the Lakes," announced the completion of that portion of the New Orleans, St. Louis and Chicago railroad which lies between Jackson, Tennessee, and Cairo, Illinois.

A CHICAGO VIEW.

The fact that the New Orleans, St. Louis and Chicago railroad has been absorbed by the Illinois Central was first made public on yesterday. The former road consists in reality of two lines, viz: the Mississippi and the New Orleans, Jackson and Great Northern, in all four hundred and fifty-five miles, which, added to the Illinois Central, forms a continuous and almost air line of nine hundred and ten miles.


