The Radicals, alias the workmen of California, have elected their ticket.

The Republicans of Maine elected almost their entire State ticket in the recent election.

Grant has sailed for America and will reach California on or about the 21st of the present month.

The first new bale of cotton received in Louisville, Ky., was sold at auction and brought 20 cents per pound.

One death from yellow fever was reported to the National Board of Health, from Morgan City La., on the 8th.

All the bridges between this place and Clinton have been re-built since the recent storm and travel between these two points is good.

An Irishman in describing America, said: "I am told that you might roll England thru it, and it wouldn't make a dint in the ground. There's fresh water oceans inside that ye might drown old Ireland in; an' as for Scotland, ye might stick it in a corner, an' ye'd niver be able to find it out."

"In the fourth place," said the preacher to his drowsy audience, "as those of you who are awake will notice," etc. There was a pause, a sudden straightening up of almost everybody in the congregation, and a general appearance on nearly every face as if to say, "Why don't you fellows keep awake better?"

Mr. Holloway, the prince of English pillmakers, has devoted \$1,250,000 to the erection of a college for the higher education of women, near London, and endowed it with \$500,000, exclusive of some land, which will probably bring a great sum on building lease. His advertising has been at the rate of \$100,000 to \$150,000, a year for the last thirty years.

The Republicans of New York held their State Convention on the 3d. Wm. A. Wheeler was elected permanent President, and the following ticket nominated: For Governor, A. B. Cornell; for Lt. Governor, George G. Hoskins, of Wyoming; for Comptroller, Jas. A. Wadsworth; for Secretary of State, Gen. Jos. B. Caw; for State Treasurer, Nathan D. Wendell.

A brother preacher who happened to be lodging with Rev. Robt. Jones, whispered to him that he was in the habit of taking a little refreshment after his sermon. The refreshment called for was a glass of brandy and water. "You can't have it by that name, my dear sir," replied Mr. Jones, "call it by its proper name and you shall have it." "And pray what is that?" "Not refreshment, but liquid poison and distilled damnation," was the awful reply.

The situation in the stricken city of Memphis is still very appalling. Up to Saturday last one thousand and five cases of yellow fever had been reported, two hundred and seventy-two of which terminated fatally. The Howards, after exhausting their local resources, have been compelled to ask aid from the outside world. J. Gould the money king of New York, contributed the handsome sum of five thousand dollars and closed his letter to the president with an injunction that should their "appeal to generous people throughout the country not be headed to keep on the good work and I will foot the bill." Two hundred and eleven nurses are daily on duty attending two hundred and five families.

THE KANSAS EXCURSION.

On the occasion of the excursion trip to Kansas, advertised extensively some weeks ago, four gentlemen of this county, Messrs. Fowles, Roubush, Swayze and McDowell, took the advantage of the excursion rate and made a flying visit to Kansas. They have recently returned well pleased with their trip. They say that on the train were about four hundred colored men, principally from along the line of the N. O., St. L. & C. R. R., who were curious to investigate for themselves the condition of affairs in this much talked of El Dorado of the colored people. The party visited Kansas City, Wyandotte and the Capital of Kansas, Topeka. At the latter place they had an interview with Gov. St. John, who addressed the party and laid before them all the advantages and disadvantages of Kansas, and even concluded his address by telling them that if they had the capital to start them in farming in Kansas they would find a good country to remove to, but if they did not have some six or seven hundred dollars to give them a start, they had far better remain in their sunny Southern homes. For mechanics he said, there was ample employment, if they were industrious, but for farm laborers the prospect is a bad one.

The gentlemen from this county who heard the speech of the Governor represent him as speaking in a very fair and candid manner, and the result of his remarks, and of the visit of the colored excursionists, was that only about half a dozen of the four hundred concluded to try their fortunes in Kansas. At Wyandotte they found some two hundred colored people in a wretched condition, living upon the charity of the kind-hearted people. They were told in regard to these that if they did not starve to death during the summer, that they would freeze to death during the winter. About twenty of these deluded people who were able to pay their passage home returned with the excursionists. The Governor and people of Kansas commended highly the prudence of the colored excursionists in trying to inform themselves before taking the important step of removing to a new and unknown country.—Natchez Democrat.

EDWIN FORREST'S CHIVALRY.

The manly elements of Mr. Forrest's character made him at all times the ready champion of the weak and defenceless. He was especially chivalrous in his conduct to women. This one instance is a sample. He was returning from New York after a successful engagement in that city, and seated opposite him in the car were two young ladies. They were traveling without a male escort. When the cars stopped at Newark a person entered and took a seat immediately back of the ladies. He was of the loud class, full of paste jewelry, impudence and bad manners. The latter was soon painfully apparent with reference to the ladies. He indulged in offensive language, and seemed to think the whole matter was a good joke. In a short time the language and the conduct of the man and the evident distress of the ladies arrested the attention of Mr. Forrest. He left his seat and facing the obnoxious passenger said: "Will you please vacate your seat? You are offensive to these ladies."

"I guess not," replied the man, with the coarse and rude expression of a bully and a ruffian; "I have paid for my ticket and will sit where I please."

"But," answered Mr. Forrest, and the color mounted to his cheeks, "your ticket does not give you the right to insult ladies. That you have done, and I will give you five minutes to vacate the seat and the car. If you prefer to leave by the window, remain, and you can be accommodated."

Mr. Forrest then drew his watch from his pocket and buttoned his coat. The ruffian took another glance at the determined eye and stalwart frame of his opponent, and with murmuring threats of vengeance left the car. The ladies had no further annoyance from him. GEN. J. B. HOOD.

The following beautiful tribute to this great soldier and honored citizen, is taken from the New Orleans Picayune:

Died on Saturday, the 30th day of August, 1879, in the city of New Orleans, JOHN B. HOOD, LIEUTENANT GENERAL, U. S. A.

Born at Owen Sound, Bath Co., Kentucky, in June, 1811. In peace, as in war, he served his country with loyalty and affection. He lived an exemplar to his fellow men, and died as die the faithful. Death came to him after a short but painful illness. His broken heart, mourning the loss of her he loved so well, did more than maledy or physical pain to the soul. He will live in the hearts of all the people of this country. In the early morning, whilst the sentinel stars still watched above him, the suffering warrior slept into death, to awake at the reveille of Eternity. Peace, blissful peace, to that proud form, which gave space and earthly semblance to the soul which glowed within its compass. Brave and magnanimous soul! Spirit of honor and devotion! Heaven-directed, thou hast crossed that dark and awful gulf which hedges in mortality from immortality! To thy memory tribute would I bring, and, weaving words of praise, as 'twere flowery garlands, scatter them above thy mortal resting place, in token that the beloved dead still live in the hearts of the living. 
