Farmer Adams and Lawyer Stone.
 [N. O. States.]
 Col. John H. Stone, of Clinton,
 the district attorney of the parish
 of East Feliciana, and Mr. T. S.
 Adams, an honest farmer of the
 same parish, and the president of
 the Farmer's Alliance of Louisi-
 ana, and State Commissioner of
 Agriculture, appointed by Nicholls
 and last but not least, the Alli-
 ance's candidate for governor in
 1892 against Nicholls or any other
 "professional" politician, are
 having a windy polemic in their
 home newspapers.
 Col. Stone was one of the orators
 reported by the Anti Lottery
 League to assist Dr. Palmer in
 fuming against the Lottery
 Amendment at the meeting of la-
 dies and children, of religious fan-
 atics, Mexican lotteryites and
 politicians at the Grand Opera
 House last month.
 Whatever of fame Stone achiev-
 ed at that grand celebration does
 not seem to have awed Mr. Adams
 to judge by the way that "horny
 handed son of toil" pours over
 him a flood of fierce denunciation
 couched in energetic but amus-
 ingly lopsided English.
 The quarrel between Stone and
 Adams is as to which one of the
 two ruined the credit, with their
 merchants in New Orleans, of a
 number of alleged "untrustworth-
 y" farmers belonging to the Clin-
 ton Union.
 Stone swears it was Adams,
 while he is very sweet in his pres-
 ent remarks about the Farmer's
 Alliance. Adams retorts that
 Stone it was and Stone alone who
 caused the supplies of the poor
 farmers to be cut off. Hear Ad-
 ams:
 Col. Stone says: "I did nothing
 in this matter that was not in
 the highest plane of professional
 propriety." It is in "the plane
 of professional propriety" in mak-
 ing the report of the commercial
 standing of an individual to re-
 flect on his personal character by
 "talking about habits, etc., etc.,
 etc." This looks more like vul-
 gar blackguardism. Yes I did, by
 request, draw the resolutions of
 censure (against Stone) adopted
 by the parish union, and my only
 regret is I did not draw them
 stronger, if they could be made so.
 Turn it as he may; torture as
 he can; twist it as he will, the
 fact remains patent that Thomp-
 son's contract with Clinton Union
 was never ruptured until Col.
 Stone communicated with that
 firm. Ah! but he did it "pro-
 fessionally." The culprit that
 swings from the gallows into eter-
 nity loses his life all the same
 when the noose is adjusted and the
 trap sprung "professionally."

 ware of them, one and all; worse
 than ten thousand ordinary
 deaths lurks in their bite or the
 slightest scratch from their terri-
 ble fangs.
 Several valuable dogs have been
 recently killed in this parish by
 their owners, and even in the lim-
 its of this town, near Freyhan's
 Upper Store, a little colored dog
 was bitten a few days since and
 several dogs shot that were bit-
 ten by a tramp cur.
 Everybody should be cautious
 and parents should be ever vigi-

lant and watchful for their chil-
 dren. The dog law should be rig-
 idly enforced in Bayou Sara, and
 here, in this town of ours, if the
 police jury does not at its meet-
 ing on the 3 instant, devise some
 protecting regulations for us, we
 advise the people to take the mat-
 ter into their own hands and shoot
 down without hesitancy, every dog
 they find running at large. The
 province of the watch dog or
 the hunting dog is not to run the
 streets. Owners of valuable
 animals will see to it
 that they are kept in the proper
 enclosure. We can well spare all
 the worthless curs found on our
 streets.
