New Orleans will still further improve its ocean service to New York. We noticed, the other day, the transfer here from Galveston of the Morgan steamers, so as to give New Orleans a tri instead of bi-weekly service with the metropolis.

And people who buy are entitled to get what they call for without intended and impertinent solicitation to buy something which they never heard of and do not ask for.

We have received scores of marked articles like the above or similar thereto, in Northern and Western papers, with a request to copy. We fancy that there is much abuse of the kind being perpetrated in large cities and around great business centres, but in the country the total amount of such underhand work don't amount to a row of pins.
