POOR SANCHO AGAIN—NOW THE OFFICERS DIDN'T PLAY WITH HIM.

It is said that in Texas a man had better kill another than steal a horse. In East Baton Rouge a fellow gets himself into serious trouble if he tackles a piker, as the following incident will illustrate—which, for rapid execution of the law, is hard to beat:

Martin Sancho, colored, is an old offender, having served two terms in the penitentiary for theft. On the night of the 6th inst., weary of freedom, he again yielded to temptation, and concluded that he would take unto himself a hog—without raising any question as to ownership. The alarm was given, and by the next morning he was interviewed by Deputy Sheriff Skiffield, who was armed with a search warrant. Sancho was conducted by that officer to the Bates' House in quick time, and on the 8th inst., tried before Judge Sherburne, and upon unmistakable evidence, found guilty of the charge. He now awaits sentence. The only question now is, as to term of service.

POLICE JURY PROCEEDINGS.

(SYNOPSIS.)

The Police Jury met on Tuesday, the 11th inst. Present—Messrs. Fergus Gardier, President; A. Perron, J. D. Fisher, F. Carmenta, J. Montegudo, J. Millican, J. Nesbit, Ed. Burnett, C. A. Roberts and Charles Graham, members.

Mr. Alfred Duplantier, Treasurer, submitted his report, which was received, showing that the receipts for the year 1878, amounted to the sum of \$15,709.88.

The report of the committee on roads and bridges relative to the Strickland Bridge, was referred back, to be returned in detailed form.

Petition of S. Wrotnowski, relative to the payment of taxes with warrants was referred to the Finance Committee.

Mr. Roberts' resolution, appropriating one thousand dollars for repairing bridges, was adopted.

The Clerk was instructed to advertise for sealed proposals for the election of a parish printer.

A petition, asking for material to build a bridge in the third ward, was granted.

The sum of one hundred and fifty dollars was allowed towards constructing a bridge in sixth ward.

Mr. Carmenta's motion, to instruct jurors to report condition of bridges in their respective wards, was adopted.

A petition relative to Joor's bridge, in the 10th ward, was referred.

The petition of Jos. Joor that he be allowed to settle his taxes, with his claims at 50 cents on the dollar was referred.

John Keown and F. Loyd were placed on the list of indigent poor at \$3.00 per month.

Petition of J. Y. and F. W. Lilly asking permission to build a gate across a road was tabled.

Petition of Thos. Brady ex-jailer was referred.

Mr. Graham's resolution to close stores on Sundays was tabled on motion of Mr. Roberts by the following vote: Ayes—Messrs. Perron, Fisher, Carmenta, Montegudo, Nesbit and Roberts—6. Nays—Messrs. Millican, Burnett and Graham—3.

Mr. M. Granary was authorized to complete the roll of 1868.

On motion of Mr. Montegudo, ward 4 was divided into two election precincts.

The following polling places were selected: Ward 1, Engine House. Ward 2, Engine House. Ward 3, Thomsen's store. Ward 4, Heath's store and Smith's store. Ward 5, Bethel Church. Ward 6, Price's school-house. Ward 7, Masonic Lodge. Ward 8, Gottlieb church and Lopez, school-house. Ward 9, Larimore's store. Ward 10, Woodland school-house.

The Jury adjourned till 24th inst.
