BY VIRTUE OF the following Proclamation from his Excellency, Samuel Douglas McEnery, Lieutenant Governor and Acting Governor of the State of Louisiana, an election will be held in this parish on TUESDAY, the SEVENTH DAY OF NOVEMBER, A. D. 1890.

PROCLAMATION BY THE GOVERNOR FOR THE Election of Presidential Electors and for Representatives in Congress. EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, State of Louisiana.

WHEREAS, It is provided by an act of Congress, entitled "An act to establish a uniform mode of holding elections for Electors for President and Vice-President in all the States of the Union," approved on the twenty-third day of January, 1845; and by an act of the General Assembly of this State entitled "An act relative to the Election of the Electors, and returns of their election and their duties, and their compensation," approved March 14, 1879; and also by article 191 of the constitution of this State, that in every year, in which an election is to be held for President and Vice-President of the United States, such election shall be held on Tuesday, next after the first Monday in the month of November in such year; and

WHEREAS, It is further provided that on the same day and at the same time, there shall be an election for members of Congress to represent the several Congressional Districts of the State of Louisiana in the Forty-seventh Congress of the United States. Now, therefore, I, SAMUEL DOUGLAS McENERY, Lieutenant Governor and Acting Governor of the State of Louisiana, have thought it my duty to issue this proclamation, ordering and directing an election to be held throughout the State of Louisiana, at such places as may be designated by the legal authorities thereof, on TUESDAY, the second day of the month of November, A. D. 1890.
