Gay. Of course no one thought of complaining. STATE NEWS.

St. Bernard Eagle: A Minstrel Company, composed exclusively of colored men, has been organized at Terre-aux-Bœufs, and will give several performances during the winter. We learn that they are all good musicians, and are well trained to impress the public when they appear upon the stage.

Natchitoches Vindicator: The large and costly machinery now lying unused in the penitentiary at Baton Rouge should not be suffered to remain longer in its present condition. We know of no place more convenient than Baton Rouge for a factory, and we hope to see one that will utilize this machinery established at an early day. It has a capacity of ten bales per day, and with 100 barrels of coal, has worked up that quantity into 5000 yards of Osaburgs, and 5000 yards of Sheeting daily.

Madison Journal: Two young darkies living near Omega, indulged in a little target practice last Tuesday; a dispute arose as to who was the best "shootist," when one of the chaps proved his expertness in the use of his weapon by pouring the contents of one of the barrels into his opponent, which of course closed the argument in the case, as no one can reason with a dead disputer.

Shreveport Times: About 9 o'clock last Sunday night, Messrs. Hamilton & Co.'s Cotton Seed Oil Mill was discovered to be on fire. Notwithstanding the herculean effort of the fire department, the entire building and out buildings were destroyed. It was impossible to save anything from the main building and only some empty sacks from the others. Books and papers of the firm were saved. There were about 400 lbs. of oil on hand and between eight and ten thousand sacks of cake. The loss can be only approximated, but is estimated at from \$85,000 to \$95,000; insurance \$52,000. The origin of the fire is unknown, as the mill is not run on Sunday's. Messrs. Hamilton & Co., will at once go to work to replace the mill with a substantial brick building and new machinery.

Every convenience is there in the way of choice pine timber, for making boxes, and a stream easily made navigable as far as the northeast corner of this parish, to bring the manufactured goods to the New Orleans market. Then, too, the operatives could find comfortable homes in one of the prettiest and healthiest regions in the South.
