PROCEEDINGS OF CITY COUNCIL.

MAYOR'S OFFICE CITY OF BATON ROUGE, Monday, Nov. 15, 1880.

Adjourned meeting. Present—Hon. Leon Jastremski, Mayor, and Messrs. Burke, Wicks, Wax, Brooks, Gimler, McCabe, Grady and Duggan, Councilmen.

The Mayor explained that the meeting was held in compliance with the provisions of the City Charter for the purpose of preparing a budget for the year 1881.

Table with 2 columns: Public Landings, Steamboat Landings, Market, Licenses, Taxes, Mayor's Court. Values range from \$1,750.00 to \$22,150.00.

Table with 2 columns: Capital Bonds and Interest, Sinking Fund for Back Indebtedness, Salaries, Charities, Contingent Expenses, Fire Department, Streets and Landings. Values range from \$4,414.00 to \$20,781.00.

On fixing the estimated expenditures, Mr. Wax offered an amendment to reduce the appropriation for sinking fund from \$1692.00 to \$1300.00.

Mr. Wax and Mr. Grady voted against the adoption of the appropriation for salaries at \$5,500.00, wishing it reduced.

Mr. Wax and Mr. Gimler voted against the appropriation of \$6,000.00 for streets and landings, favoring a reduction.

Resolved, That the Mayor or Chief of Police be authorized to employ three extra policemen to assist the regular police until February 1st, 1881.

On a call of the vote the result was—Yeas—Wax, Gimler, Grady, McCabe. Nays—Burke, Wicks, Duggan, Brooks.

On motion, duly seconded, the Council adjourned. LEON JASTREMSKI, Mayor. GEO. HENDERSON, Secretary.
