

BOURBON FREEBOOTERS.

Yesterday the States gave Mr. W. P. Kellogg the opportunity of venturing his views of the political situation, particularly of the contest for the senatorship.

The country will perceive, in reading Mr. Kellogg's views, that he and the squad of official blood suckers who have been too insensible to shame to be driven from his banner and the public pup-tubs, have made no advance in liberality of opinion.

They are Bourbon political freebooters. They were trained in the belief that politics was a system of robbery; that the duty and right of the office holder was to prey upon the people; that constitutions and laws were only shams with which to gull the populace; that the talk about principles, was the jargon of fools or the deceptive lingo of sharp political free-booters.

As we have remarked, Mr. Kellogg's interview with a representative of the States, shows that he and his retainers in this State still adhere to this theory of politics, and that he confidently counts upon his party to maintain his lawless pretensions in accordance with this theory.

What next strikes us most forcibly, is the attitude of hostility which this insolent usurper and pretender assumes in his remarks toward the South and especially toward the State he has the audacity to claim to represent. Indeed Mr. Kellogg speaks of Louisiana in the same spirit that a Roman proconsul may have spoken of a conquered province in Asia, which it was his mission and his purpose to plunder and insult.

This Senator-Senator by virtue of bribery, violence and force—does not treat the political issues which interest this people, as if he were a citizen of Louisiana discussing differences of free opinions upon public questions; he talks, on the contrary, as if he were an enemy of the State, as if he were an epauletted swash buckler whose duty it is to bully and overawe his obstreperous vassals.

He goes further and threatens Mr. Jones, whose seat he says, has been questioned by that famous body of unscrupulous partisans known as the Teller Committee, with expulsion as soon as the triumphant Republicans obtain control of the Senate. In short, the whole tenor of his conversation, as will be seen by reference to it in the States of yesterday, was what the great virtuous and patriotic North can and may do with the weak, rebellious and impudent South, if he be disturbed in the possession of his stolen seat in the Senate.

Fully in accord with the views Kellogg expressed in his interview with our representative, is the scheme now being hatched in the customhouse by Kellogg and his coadjutors, and disclosed in the Times of yesterday, to contest the seats of Gen. King and Mr. Blanchard in the next Congress.

That these are the purposes of the Kellogg wing of the Radical party of this State, there is no doubt, and if they represent the Southern policy of Mr. Garfield and the Republican members of Congress, we may bid farewell to those hopes and dreams of the early decline of the spirit of sectional bit-

terness that has so long disturbed the country. We trust, however, that Mr. Kellogg is no longer the prophet and apostle of the Republican party in the South. We hope the masses of the people have seen the disastrous effects of sectional strife; of the practice of lawless and partisan methods in politics, and that we are to have in future, a government of peace and justice inspired by a broad and liberal nationalism.

In one respect we fear Kellogg is correct. He confidently assumes that he will not be disturbed in the possession of his seat, and he counts, we regret to say it, on Senators Hampton, Butler, Bayard, Pendleton and Davis to support him. Several of these Senators, at the last session of Congress, placed themselves on record as supporters of Kellogg's claim to his seat, and there seems to be no reason to suppose they will change their attitude. Nevertheless, we think that Governor Wiltz has acted wisely in appointing a Senator to represent the honor and interests of Louisiana in this contest. We have differed with the Governor upon many measures of his administration. But in this matter we fully and cordially endorse his action as wise and courageous, and we think he could have chosen no nobler or abler man to represent the State than Judge Manning.

The fact that Kellogg holds a seat in the Senate is due entirely to that cowardice of the Democratic party which has paralyzed its strength and covered it with disaster. With the noblest principles of free government as its creed, it has faltered in their defense whenever the audacity of the Republicans have attacked them. It has temporized, retreated and surrendered, while the Republican party has carried forward its revolutionary programme, and until there no longer seems to be a living and aggressive issue between the two parties, or at least one which the Democratic leaders have the courage to defend and maintain. That Kellogg, in violation of the constitution and against the wishes of the people of Louisiana, holds a seat in the Senate, we repeat, is one of the evidences of this moral condition of the Democratic party.

But Louisiana should not quietly consent to the wrong. It is her duty, as a sovereign State, to resist to the utmost and protest unceasingly against the outrage upon her right to representation in the Senate. Neither the Senators from South Carolina, nor Mr. Bayard, nor Mr. Pendleton, nor any other Senator or Senators, however distinguished, should be permitted to silence her voice of protest, or check the Executive of the State and her Senators and Representatives in the determined purpose to maintain her constitutional rights, and protect her honor against such frauds as Mr. Kellogg.—New Orleans States.

THE KILLING OF DR. JONES.

The unfortunate death of Dr. W. B. Jones, of Lake Providence is to be regretted. The doctor was on the editorial staff of the North Louisiana Republican, which paper characterizes this misfortune as political assassination. On what evidence it bases its opinion it leaves us to imagine. Considering the early hour of the night, the publicity of the place where he fell, and the wound, we consider his death the result of, perhaps, his own act.—Delta, La., Journal.

As we remarked yesterday, we know absolutely nothing of the affair. The Republican, a radical organ published at Lake Providence, persistently refuses to publish any particulars of the unfortunate killing to the public, but a resident of Lake Providence assured us this morning that there is no secret about the matter in the place where the killing occurred and that Dr. Jones was killed by a Republican! It will doubtless serve a valuable purpose in aiding Mr. Lanier, who we understand proposes to contest the seat of Gen. John Floyd King, in the next house of representatives. The blood of the martyrs is said to be the seed of the church, and hence the desire to secure the honors of martyrdom for the late Dr. Jones. The fact that this killing is expected to promote the aspirations of Mr. Lanier for a seat in Congress, may account for the large amount of milk in this diminutive and bogus cocoanut.—Viक्सburg Commercial.

NO MORE FOREIGNERS.—The next battle cry of the Republicans will be "no more foreigners"! "America for Americans!" In one of his New York letters to the Cincinnati Enquirer, Gath writes as follows:

There are signs in Republican papers of opposition to promiscuous immigration into this country. The Tribune prints a letter to-day, saying: "The country is our property. It belongs neither to Ireland nor to China, and it is for us to say who shall share it with us. None but de-

cent, thrifty persons should be admitted to residence here, and the native born only should possess the full privilege of citizenship. We want to secure a peaceful future for our children, and now is the time to do it. If we have a right to a protective tariff as to imported merchandise we certainly have a right to discriminate as to imported individuals."

As soon as the Radicals get through cursing the people of the South, we shall expect them to open on "the d-d Dutch and Irish." Bigotry and intolerance must curse somebody.

One John C. Palmer, of Eureka, Nev., has written an open letter to Senator Wade Hampton, in which he denounces him for his "cowardly insult" to his "friend John Sherman," and proposes to accept his "alleged challenge" himself. He names double-barrelled shotguns, loaded with buck-shot, as the weapons, and suggests Omaha as a place of meeting, the terms of the duel to be: "Distance forty-five paces, fire and advance." Mr. Palmer refers his personal character as a gentleman to ex-Governors Low and Irwin, of California, and Delegate Cannon, of Utah.

Pointe Coupee Banner: A short time ago all the New Orleans papers raised a lugh and cry about ex-Sheriff Gauthreaux being a defaulter to the city and State, both, in large amounts—more than a hundred thousand dollars to each—and for about a week they raised a terrible racket about the matter; but very suddenly all comment in regard thereto ceased, and the subject has never been mentioned since. The people of the country are now beginning to grow curious, and would like to know whether Mr. Gauthreaux did really defraud the city and State out of those large large sums, and, if so, whether he had any accomplices, and who they were? People are also asking what steps are being taken to recover the money, and what is the prospect of success? Country people are particularly interested in regard to the State funds said to have been stolen. If the State has been really defrauded and robbed to any extent, it seems to us that Gov. Wiltz should take an active interest in the matter, have it thoroughly sifted and prosecute the guilty parties to the bitter end. By so doing he might make for himself such a reputation in this State as Gov. Tilden earned in New York some years ago.

There is great suffering among the operatives who were employed in the silk mill of Wright Smith, who failed recently at Paterson, N. J. At the time of his failure Mr. Smith had nearly two hundred weavers and spinners at work in his mill. They were all English. They are now out of work and unable to obtain situations. Some of them are almost starving. Some of the men have wives and children in England, and are unable to send them money, although they are destitute and need funds.

Scarlet fever in its most virulent form has attacked the children in the eastern and better part of Richmond, Ind., and is spreading rapidly. A number of deaths have occurred within a few days, and nearly all of those now affected by it are extremely ill.
