SCHOOL BOARD PROCEEDINGS.

ROOMS OF SCHOOL BOARD, Baton Rouge, La., March 1, 1881. The Parish School Board met pursuant to adjournment, with the following members present: E. W. Willis, President; J. B. Magruder, Secretary; J. W. McMain, T. B. Brown, Guy Samuel. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Mrs. Louck's resignation as teacher of the Brookston school was accepted and all petitions relating to the school were laid on the table.

Mr. Jesse K. Shelburne was appointed teacher of the Mount Pleasant school in the 4th Ward in place of Mr. Crane.

The petition asking for the location of a school at Mr. Ben Long's was granted on condition that the land and school house be donated to the parish board, the local board to receive the same and report to the president. When these conditions are complied with, Miss Lola Bills will be assigned as teacher, and the following appointed on the local board: Ben Long, R. W. Greenwell, and H. M. Brown.

Mr. McMain offered the following resolution, which was adopted: Resolved, That the school at Pratt's School House be discontinued and that the President issue a warrant for the amount due Mr. Lee, when he brings his report endorsed by the Local Board. The bill of Mr. Hubbs for costs in the suit of the School Board against R. W. Knickerbocker was allowed and ordered paid. The Board adjourned until the first Saturday in April.




