A TERRAPIN FARM.

I have just heard of an instance, says a Washington correspondent, where a United States Senator is supported by terrapins. Senator Dennis of Maryland, so my information goes, has about twelve acres of land put down in a pond that is fed by salt water.

In it terrapins are raised for the market, and it is said that over 12,000 "counts" have been sold from it in one year. It may be noted, for the benefit of the uninitiated, that a "terrapin" over seven inches in length; and that "counts" are sold by number—bringing from \$10 to \$14 a dozen or about \$1 each. In market they retail for about \$20 per dozen—and in the fashionable restaurants are served at \$1.50 a plate—one terrapin filling about three plates. Smaller terrapins are sold at lower figures and are "diamond" backs in fact as well as name.

STATE NEWS.

Morehouse Clarion: Serious fears of an overflow are entertained by the people of the 5th Ward. The water is rising daily and many planters are greatly alarmed at the impending danger. Untold destruction and disaster would be the result of an inundation now, and we do hope it may be averted. The Mississippi, however, is rising slowly but surely every day, and it might be the part of true wisdom for our Fifth Ward friends to hold themselves in constant readiness to make the best they can of a sea of intruding waters.

Lake Providence Herald: The body of an unknown white man was found in the river, a few miles above town on Sunday evening last, when the coroner was notified of the fact, who immediately repaired to the spot, when that body was brought on shore and an inquest held. About thirty dollars in cash was found on his person, but nothing to lead to his identity could be discovered. The coroner's jury having finished their labors, returned to town, leaving the corpse on the bank unprotected, until the arrival of the carpenter, an hour or two afterwards, who was sent there to make a coffin in which to bury the deceased. We learn that the carpenter states that on his arrival on the scene four or five dogs had attacked the body, and were rapidly devouring it, and that it was only after one-half of the pack were killed that the remainder were forced to retire from the scene. It is said that his feet were eaten off, while his cheeks and neck was being rapidly devoured by the hungry curs.

Minden Democrat: The election on last Saturday passed off quietly, and resulted in the re-election of the Mayor and entire board. Lake Providence Herald: The new protection levee, just completed in the neighborhood of Goodrich's landing, at a cost of from \$12,000 to \$14,000, gave way on Tuesday morning, and at this writing is beyond human control, the break being several hundred yards wide. Our informant states that the break occurred in front of Stein's store, and that at the time it was no larger than a man's body, and could have been prevented if the parties in the vicinity, who should have exerted themselves, did, absolutely, nothing at all to avert the calamity. Our informant, (a laboring man) stated that he could have secured it with the greatest ease, but no one could be found who was willing to pay him for his services. If this statement is true we have only to say that it is unfortunate for any community to be cursed with the presence of such people, and the sooner they are known to their neighbors the better. This break is about fifteen miles below Providence, and will inundate a large scope of country west and south, while it will back up on many places north in this parish. But the destruction that will occur with us is nothing to compare with what may befall Madison and Tensas parishes. This calamity, coming as it does on the heels of a disastrous crop year, will, we fear, paralyze many of the planters along the "bottom."
