Increased Value of Real Estate in Baton Rouge.

On Saturday last, Sheriff Bates began at 12 M., the sale of real estate for partition among the creditors of Hart & Hebert.

For several years past, real estate offered at public sale, has seldom brought over two thirds of its appraised value.

The Rosenfield Stores, on Third street, appraised at \$10,000, were sold to Mrs. J. M. Parker for \$10,100.

The Halsey Stables, appraised at \$2,500, were sold to Mr. George Henderson for \$2,450.

The Hart Residence, on Church street, appraised at \$6,000, was sold to Col. D. F. Boyd for \$5,600.

A two-thirds interest in the Newell Stores, on Lafayette street, appraised at \$4,000, was sold to Mr. Henry Newell, for \$4,000.

The one-half interest in the Harney House, appraised at \$5,000, was sold for \$5,500, to Messrs. John D. Fisher, Henry Badley, Sr., Jas. E. Blouin and William Garig.

The one-half interest in the house occupied by Mr. F. Gustabel, appraised at \$1,000, was sold to the occupant for \$800.

Another property appraised at \$600, was sold to Mr. Joseph D. Blouin for \$550.

The Shelmire tract, at the Plains, appraised at \$800, was sold to Mr. Henry Badley for \$950.

Several other pieces of property, consisting of vacant lots, were sold for more than the appraisement.

Other sales of property to the amount of \$815, also brought more than the appraised value.

STATE NEWS GLEANINGS.

Patriot Democrat: Two more emigrants from Germany, who have relatives in this parish, arrived here during the past week.

St. Charles Herald: Jas. Woods, who was so badly burnt last week, a full account of which appeared in our last issue, died at his residence last Saturday.

St. Charles Herald: There were six sm-strokes in the neighborhood of Hahnville on last Wednesday. Two on the Home Place, two on Lafitte's plantation and two cross-tie cutters at work in the swamps.

Feliciana Sentinel: We were pleased to hear a leading merchant remark during the past week that the credit furnishing sales, up to date, are much below those of last and previous years.

Donaldsonville Chief: Jim Roberson, a colored man aged 54 years, employed as a laborer on the Nolan place, near Donaldsonville, was drowned in Bayou Lafourche last Saturday evening, while bathing in that stream in front of the plantation a short distance below the railroad bridge.

City Item: For several years Robert Maginnis has been employed as pressman on the Price Current. Notwithstanding the fact that he had the moral influence of a newspaper constantly about him, and had access to an occasional exchange, abounding with moral advice, he fell from grace, and it now appears, has been systematically robbing the office of paper and disposing of it to outside parties.

Lafayette Advertiser: Celestin, colored, was arrested last week and incarcerated in the parish prison on a charge of burglary. On Wednesday morning, 16th inst., on opening the jail, the jailer found that his lifeless body was all that was left to answer the charge.

Opelousas Democrat: On Saturday night, the 4th ultimo, a negro by the name of Sandy Jenkins living on the Clapp place near town, for some petty offense committed, was given the option of the "law" or a cow-hiding.

Feliciana Sentinel: A private letter from Mr. A. J. Herrin, Justice of the Peace of the sixth ward of this parish informs us that on the 6th of June, the dead body of a man was seen floating down the river, in the vicinity of Mr. John Clark's residence.

Shreveport Standard: On Saturday night when the eclipse of the moon took

place there was a colored dance going on at Mugginsville, and all present were enjoying themselves hugely. In the midst of the enjoyment a colored individual stepped in in an excitable manner and called a halt, saying the last day had come, the world was covered with darkness and the moon was covered with blood.

New Iberia Sugar Bowl: Last Monday our town was a scene of great excitement in the vicinity of Justice Langlois' office when it was learned that Constable J. M. Senac had shot and instantly killed a colored man named Jeff Hill, while on trial for beating his wife last Sunday.

Shreveport Times: For several weeks the police have been on the alert for a negro man named William Green, who is wanted for larceny.

Downs again came to the assistance of the officer and also another gentleman and between the three they soon secured the desperate negro. Meantime a large number of negroes had assembled and violently opposed the officer and Mr. Downs and threatened to rescue Green at all hazards, and only for the coolness and determination displayed by the white men the negroes doubtless would have carried their threats into execution.
