Upon hearing of the order the Board and Faculty adopted suitable resolutions asking that same be revoked, which, together with a memorial spontaneously gotten up by the cadet corps, was at once telegraphed to the Secretary of War and to Gen. Sherman.

The country is in profound peace and there are more officers in the army than are needed to command it; consequently, we can see no just reason for depriving the State of Louisiana, of the valued services of an officer, whose genial manners, have gained him hosts of friends, while he is zealously engaged in the good work of training our young men in accordance with the letter and spirit of the law, which provides for the detail of an officer to each State college.

The War Department can allow an officer to remain with the Board and the people desire at the University, and it seems to us that this deference to the wishes of their representatives and of the people themselves, would in no way do injury, or inconvenience even, to the service.

We sincerely hope that this unaccountable order will be revoked before Col. Jamar is subjected to the expense and trouble of breaking up his temporary home.

The University Ball.

The ball at the University last night was, beyond question, the most brilliant that Baton Rouge has seen since the one given on the occasion of the inauguration of Gov. Moore, an event which is frequently alluded to by those here who attended it.

The front of the handsome edifice occupied by the University, the trees and shrubbery were lit up with Chinese lanterns of variegated hues and shapes, which gave to the place a most pleasing appearance.

From the great number of strangers in the city, it was expected that the attendance at the ball would be very large, but the most sanguine had never anticipated such an outpouring of "fair women and brave men" as the one which occurred last night.
