PROSPECTUS.

In tendering this, our prospectus, we wish to avoid flowery, deceptive language, and to set forth in detail a few simple, plain facts, briefly stating what we have done, where we have operated and what we propose to do.

The Prairie Mamou Oil & Mineral Co. L't'd, domiciled at Jennings, Calcasieu parish, La. is a duly organized and chartered company, capitalized at \$200,000. Captain D. E.
