Postmaster Ferree has estab-
lished a temporary office at the
McFarlain hotel. The loss to the
department could not this morn-
ing be ascertained; but much of
the property of the office was
carried out to a place of safety.

The total loss of the confra-
gation cannot be approximated, as
everything at the present writing
appears to be in a state of chaos
and confusion. A conservative
estimate, however, has suggested
that a half million dollars would
not overreach the mark.

Dire and terrible as this morn-
ing's calamity may be, the peo-
ple of Jennings are not built of
that material that will sit supinely
and bemoan its great loss. To-
morrow, as soon as the debris
will have cooled sufficiently to
permit of it, work will no doubt
be commenced to rebuild in bet-
ter and more stately and durable
form than which has gone up in
smoke.
