## Jennings Citizens Want Municipal Ownership.

**WE HAVE TURNED THE TABLES**  
 American Cavalry Surprise a Band of Insurgents at Buam.

Manila, Nov. 14.—Captain Hartman's troop of the First cavalry early Tuesday morning surprised 400 insurgents at Buam in Matanzas province, Southwestern Luzon. Half, the insurgents were armed with rifles. They were prepared for an attack and were in rifle pits. The cavalry attacked the insurgents on the flank, killing sixteen of them, wounding five and capturing nine rifles. The insurgents broke and run the cavalry pursuing them.

Two large boatloads of arms are reported to have landed on the southern part of the Batangas peninsula and taken to Durangan.

Major West, stationed in that locality, is endeavoring to find these arms.

**THERE ARE TALKS OF PEACE**  
 A Story in Which the Boers Are Reported as Asking for Peace.

New York, Nov. 14.—Peace negotiations are reported from every quarter except Botha's headquarters in the saddle, says the London representative of the Tribune.

There is a story that the Boers in arms have approached Kitchener and have intimated a desire for peace, without any reference to Kruger, Steny or Botha, but this is a transparent fiction, started for the purpose of explaining Salisbury's veiled reference to grounds of confidence which he could not lay bare. There can be no peace while 8000 Boers and Cape rebels hold the field under a dozen or more guerrilla leaders.

The recent address of Charles Francis Adams of Boston, drawing an analogy between the conditions in South Africa and those in the United States at the time of the Appomattox surrender and showing that Lee refused to sanction guerrilla warfare because he considered it immoral and unchristian, has produced a deep impression here. The imperial South African association has decided to reprint the text of the address in pamphlet form for the benefit of pro-Boer sympathizers.

## NEW BRICK PLANT FOR OUR CITY.

A Factory With Large Capital Behind to be Put in at Once.

Houck will go to Houston to look after some details for the company, after which he will return and begin, with a force of men, to build sheds and prepare for installing the machinery. The plant will be located along side the Southern Pacific railroad east of town. Sidetracks will be built and it is expected by the company to do a large shipping business.
