A Comparison.

The firm of Charles Clark & Co., who operate several dredge boats at Beaumont, have given some figures in the cost of oil as compared with coal as fuel:

Coal per month,	\$9,500
Oil,	1,250
Transportation,	450
Storage barge,	3,500

Total, \$15,200

Difference in favor of oil \$4,300  
Saved in fireman's wages 700

Total saving, \$5,000

The item of \$3,500 for a storage barge will of course not have to be expended again. The fuel for the following month will cost them but \$1,000. This is a remarkable saving.

## AMERICAN TROOPS

DO GOOD WORK

Climbed a High Precipice and Attack a Body of Insurgents.

Manila, Nov. 25.—Captain Edward P. Lawton's company of the Nineteenth infantry has attacked and captured an insurgent fort on Bohol island, south of Cebu, in the Vinyan group. This fort was surrounded on all sides by a precipice and the only entrance to the higher ground was guarded by a stockade with a line of entrenchments behind it. Captain Lawton sent Sergt. McMahon and twenty men to climb the precipice and attack the fort in the rear. Sergeant McMahon's party accomplished their task after three hours' climbing through the thick undergrowth of brush and vines that covered the almost perpendicular cliff. They took the enemy by surprise and drove them from the fort. As the insurgents escaped they had to pass the remainder of Captain Lawton's company at a distance of 150 yards. Here the enemy suffered terrible losses.

The insurgents defended themselves with both cannon and rifles. The cannon were captured, the smaller ones were removed, while the larger ones were buried. Captain Lawton in his report makes special mention for bravery of Sergeants List and McMahon.

The Tramp Nuisance.

Lake Charles sends up a wail against the tramp nuisance. The Press says in part: "These gentry are flocking here for a winter resort. Scarcely a freight train passes through but drops one or more from the rods, like over-ripe fruits. Nearly every one exhibits as his stock in trade a missing foot, leg, hand, arm or eye. They carry ill printed cards containing a poor song or a plausible lie. . . . So far not one has come to the city with a crippled tongue. The prison has no terror for them, and they boast that to the officers that no power can make them work." Well, "there are others," in the same boat. Every town in the state is called upon in proportion to its size to furnish grub and whiskey funds to these itinerant leeches who prey upon society.

Refused To Accept Fee.

Baltimore, Nov. 25.—It was learned yesterday that Mr. Isidor Raynor, chief counsel for Rear Admiral W. S. Schley in the recent hearing before the court of inquiry, has refused to accept a fee for his services. A mutual friend of the admiral and Mr. Raynor stated that the admiral recently sent a valuable gold watch to Mr. Raynor and a magnificent brooch of diamonds and pearls to Mrs. Raynor.

Ink Stains on Wood.

Kentuckienne says: "If an ink stain gets upon a mahogany writing desk you can remove it with a few drops of spirits of nitre in a spoonful of water. Put a little on the ink and rub it at once with a cloth wet in water, or it will make a white spot. To clean an old mahogany dining table wash it off with a soft clean flannel and a tepid suds made of a pure mild soap; then on a thick flannel wad pour melted wax until there is a good wax surface. When cold and hard, rub the table, following the grain, until it looks like a mirror."

## GENERAL PINZON

GIVES ORDERS

He Intends to Bombard Colon and Notifies the Different Governments.

Colon, November, 24.—As a result of an exchange of notes between the United States gunboat Machias and the General Pinzon, Ignacio Filixio commanding the Pinzon, which has 600 men on board, has officially notified the American, British and French warships now in the harbor that he intends to bombard Colon tomorrow (Monday), thus giving twenty four hours notice.

The various consuls are notifying their respective fellow citizens that refuge may be had on board the warships.

Lieutenant Commander McCrea of the Machias is the senior naval officer and he awaits instructions from Washington regarding the threat to bombard.

## SOUTHERN WELL

FLOWS OIL

Water from Well on Wilkins Tract Shows Streaks of Rich Oil

On Sunday afternoon a vein of oil was struck in the well of the Southern Oil Company, which is being put down on the Wilkins tract near the sawmill. The oil could be seen in considerable quantities as the water flowed from the well.

The well is now at a depth of 720 feet and it is remarkable that flowing oil should be struck at that depth. The driller, who has brought in five gushers at Beaumont says the formation is the same as at Beaumont.

The drill is going now through blue clay and oil sand, and the oil is constantly oozing out. The grass and all vegetation in the vicinity of the well is covered with oil, and at several places gas will shoot out of the ground by simply making a hole with a stick.

A new company headed by M. E. Layne, F. F. Kitterman, and Dr. Vail of Rock Rapids, Iowa, has been organized and will develop holdings in the Jennings field.
