The Stock Ordinance.

The cases of McFarlain and Bonnin against the town of Jennings will be heard in the supreme court at New Orleans tomorrow. The case in question is a test of the stock ordinance passed sometime ago by the city of Jennings. Some stock belonging to McFarlain and Bonnin were impounded and advertised to be sold. The parties then took out an injunction enjoining the town from disposing of or holding the said stock. The case was tried in Lake Charles and the town lost. An appeal was then taken. The question is an important one involving considerable uncertainty as to extent of authority the town is entitled to, and the decision is looked to with interest.

The New Chair Cars.

The Southern Pacific has inaugurated a new chair car system on its line from New Orleans west, and in consequence its patrons, and the colored people in particular, are pleased.

The new arrangement gives the company twenty-four new chair cars of the latest improved model, with up-to-date equipment. These new cars are used by the white passengers. The old cars—and they do not appear very old at that—have been placed at the disposal of the colored passengers.

"The cars have been on now for two or three weeks," said one of the trainmen last night. "The white patrons are simply charmed with the elegance of equipment, and as for the negroes, I haven't heard one of them kick at the new order of things."

The local from New Orleans arriving at 10 o'clock last night, had three chair cars. The first was No. 508 and was occupied by colored passengers; the second No. 370 was used as a smoker for whites; the third was No. 524, one of the pretty new ones, and was crowded with the traffic dominated by the roads as first-class.

"As far as known the Southern Pacific is the first road in the South to grant the negro the privilege of riding in a chair car," said the trainman, "and they seem to appreciate the move, if what they say is any indication of their feelings."—Houston Post.
