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

FORCE EXTRADITION.

A Bill Introduced in Congress to Cover Taylor's Case.

INVOLVE ALL STATES

The Measure Forces the Governor of a State to Recognize Extradition and if He Refuses the Government Officials to Act.

Washington, Dec. 14.—Representative Robinson of Indiana has introduced two measures to secure the extradition of ex-Governor Taylor of Kentucky from Indiana to Kentucky, where he is wanted in connection with the Goebel tragedy.

One of the measures is for the investigation as to whether the governor of any state is justified in refusing to recognize extradition papers from the governor of another state.

The other provides that in the case the governor refuses to recognize extradition papers they may be executed by the United States marshal.

After some routine business the house agreed to the special order for considering of the Philippine tariff bill and adjourned until Tuesday.

The house committee on interstate and foreign commerce at its first meeting voted to favorably report the Hepburn bill, providing for the construction of the Nicaragua canal.

The house ways and means committee ordered the Philippine tariff bill reported.

Terrible Blizzard Striking.

Rock Springs, Wyo., Dec. 14.—A report from the Red Desert sheep range says that Charles Barnes, a herder, was frozen to death in the blizzard that has raged for the past day or two.

Barnes was from Garden City, Kan. The blizzard has scattered herds in small bunches all over the country, and it is feared the loss will be great. A Mexican herder, name not learned, is reported frozen.

Trains Are Delayed.

Cheyenne, Wyo., Dec. 14.—The blizzard raging throughout southern Wyoming is terrific. Everything is delayed from three to five hours and a blockade is imminent. Great distress is reported by sheepmen of the Red Desert section and in the southern Utah country on the desert the losses will be large, unless a break occurs within a few hours.

At Fremont, Sweetwater county, a passenger train ploughed through a bunch of sheep huddled in the cut to keep out of the wind, and over 500 of the animals were reported killed. They were hurled in every direction and buried out of sight in the drifts.

Fog Delays Traffic.

New York, Dec. 14.—The delay of traffic is caused all over New York by heavy fog. Ferries, elevated trains and surface cars impeded.

The Storm in London.

London, Dec. 14.—The storm which has prevailed since Thursday has caused telegraphic breakdowns throughout the united kingdom unequalled since 1851. Even the north is practically cut off from the south and many of the provincial towns are so snowbound that the courts have been closed owing to the litigants residing in the country being unable to reach towns. The gales in the channel are abating. The large Austrian steamer Nerthea, which was left the yards of her builders at Londonderry has been driven on the rocks off Warren Point.

The Frisco Extension.

Austin, Dec. 14.—The St. Louis and San Francisco Railway company has informed the railroad commission that the road from Sherman to Carrollton, a distance of 53 miles, would be completed by Dec. 20, and that the belt line connecting with the Fort Worth and Rio Grande at Fort Worth, with a length of four and one-half miles, would be completed by Jan. 15. Through trains will then be placed in operation over the new line through Fort Worth to Brownwood. The letter to the railroad commission states that the work of constructing the extension south from Brownwood to Brady will begin next spring. The line south from Brady to San Antonio runs by way of Mason and Fredericksburg. The survey, however, has not been completed.

Will Be of Great Value.

Kansas City, Dec. 14.—The southwest is experiencing the first general storm this winter. The thermometer has fallen decidedly since Thursday night and in many places rain has turned to sleet, causing damage to telephone and telegraph wires. The storm will prove of great value to farmers. Many small streams had gone dry, leaving no water for stock, and wheat needed moisture badly.

Five Years for Laura Bullion.

St. Louis, Dec. 14.—Laura Bullion, the female companion of Ben Kilpatrick, the Montana train robber suspect, who was convicted of having in possession forged national bank notes, has been sentenced by United States District Judge Adams to five years' imprisonment in the federal prison at Leavenworth, Kan. Kilpatrick received a sentence of 15 years imprisonment at Jefferson City, Mo.

Mysteriously Killed.

San Francisco, Dec. 14.—Adolph Oppenheimer, who was one of the principal witnesses against Theodore Duran, the murderer of Blanche Bryant, was mysteriously shot and killed here in his shooting gallery. Robbery was the motive, a box containing \$750 having been taken from the place. No clue to the assassin.

CHARTER OF THE JENNINGS OIL COMPANY

STATE OF LOUISIANA, PARISH OF CALCASIEU. Before the undersigned Notary Public, in and for the parish of Calcasieu, and in the presence of the undersigned competent witnesses residing in the said parish, personally came the persons whose names are hereunto subscribed and declared that, availing themselves of the laws of Louisiana relative to the formation and organization of corporations, they do hereby form and constitute themselves and their successors as well as such other persons as may hereafter become associated with them and their successors, into a corporation or body politic in law for the objects and purposes, and under the stipulations, articles and conditions, as follows:

ARTICLE I. The name and title of the said corporation shall be JENNINGS OIL COMPANY, and by the said name it shall enjoy and carry on the business for the period of ninety-nine years from the date of this act. The Town of Jennings, in the parish of Calcasieu, La., is the place chosen for its domicile, and all citations against it, served on its president or in his absence, shall remain in office until the president is able to act, on the vice-president.

ARTICLE II. The purpose for which this corporation is established, and the nature of the business to be carried on by it, are any one, or more, or all, of the following: To construct, work and maintain railroads, canals, plank roads, bridges and ferries, whether within or without the limits of this State; to carry on manufactories of cotton, woolen, linen, silk and hempen cloths and other goods; to construct and work on works to supply cities and towns with gas or water; to construct and work on works to compress cotton; to construct and carry on iron, brass and copper foundries; to construct and maintain dry docks or floating docks for the building or repairing of ships and other vessels; to manufacture iron, copper, lead or other metals, earthenware or stoneware, engines, cotton gins, machinery, paper, gun powder and agricultural implements; to refine sugar, and to navigate the sea by steam; to establish, maintain and operate lines of telegraph and chemical factories; to construct and maintain docks, steamships and other vehicles for the transportation of freight and passengers; to construct, maintain and operate works of drainage, sewerage and land reclamation; to open and work mines for developing and obtaining natural gas, petroleum, coal, asphaltum, salt, sulphur, ore, metals, and mineral and volatile substances of all kinds; and this corporation shall have power and authority to hold, receive, purchase, convey, and to lease, in fee, property both real and personal, in so far as the same may be incidental to its objects and purposes. This corporation is further organized for the purpose of acquiring the assets of the JENNINGS OIL COMPANY of Jennings, Calcasieu parish, Louisiana, at an agreed valuation thereon of SIXTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$60,000.00), to be paid for in full paid up Capital Stock of this Corporation, and the present corporation assuming all the liabilities of the said company.

ARTICLE III. The capital stock of this corporation is fixed at SIXTY THOUSAND DOLLARS, divided into Sixty Thousand Shares of par value of One Dollar each. Upon a transfer of all the assets of the said JENNINGS OIL COMPANY to this Corporation, the Sixty Thousand Dollars Capital Stock of this Corporation shall be issued to the said company as full paid, and in addition thereto this Corporation shall assume all the liabilities of said company. This issue of said stock and assumption of said liability being taken and considered a fair, equitable, and proper equivalent for the assets of said Company, and all transfers of stock shall be made on the books of the Company at its office in Jennings, Louisiana, and only on surrender of the certificates of stock shall be signed by the President and countersigned by the secretary.

ARTICLE IV. All the corporate powers of this corporation shall be vested in and exercised by a Board of Directors composed of seven stockholders to be selected by a majority of the stockholders on the third Tuesday of April of each year, commencing with the year 1902. All such elections shall be by ballot, under the supervision of three commissioners to be appointed by the Board of Directors, who shall receive all votes cast by the stockholders in person or by proxy, and who shall canvass and declare the result of such election. All such elections shall be held after due notification thereof, given during thirty days previously in a daily or weekly newspaper, published in the Parish of Calcasieu, Louisiana, and in the Parish of the herein named, as well as those subsequently elected shall continue in office until their successors are duly elected inducted. For the transaction of any and all business, a majority of the members of said board shall constitute a quorum; the said board shall have the right to establish all such By-Laws, rules and regulations which it may deem requisite for the support, management and regulation of the Corporation; it shall be authorized to appoint, employ, and discharge officers, agents and employees as may be deemed necessary for the proper management and carrying out of the business of the Corporation, and shall likewise fix the compensation to be paid them, as well as to the other officers provided for by this Charter. At the first meeting of said Board, after each annual election, they shall elect from their number a president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, and general manager. The Board of Directors, by resolution, passed by a two-thirds majority, may designate three or more directors to constitute an executive committee, which committee, to the extent provided for in said resolution, or in the By-Laws of the Corporation, shall have the power of the Board of Directors in the management of the business of this corporation, and in affixing the seal of the corporation whatever required. The said Board shall from time to time determine the extent to which the

accounts and books of the Corporation and of them, shall be open to the inspection of the stockholders, and the time, place, conditions and regulations of such inspection. Until the first annual election to be held under this charter, the following persons are designated and shall constitute the Board of Directors, and be the officers, respectively, of this corporation: Alba Heywood, W. Scott Heywood, S. A. Spencer, F. R. Jaenke, I. D. L. Williams, T. C. Mahaffey, and A. C. Wilkins, with the following members thereof serving as officers of the Corporation respectively: S. A. Spencer, President; Alba Heywood, Vice-President; F. R. Jaenke, Treasurer; I. D. L. Williams, Secretary; and T. C. Mahaffey, General Manager.

ARTICLE V. At all meetings of the stockholders, each stockholder shall be entitled to one vote, in person or by proxy, for each share of stock held by him.

ARTICLE VI. Whenever this Corporation is dissolved either by limitation of its Charter or from any other cause, its affairs shall be liquidated by the commissioners to be appointed from among the stockholders at a meeting of the stockholders to be held after due notification thereof given during thirty days previously in a daily or weekly newspaper published in the Parish of Calcasieu. Said commissioners shall remain in office until the affairs of the said Corporation shall have been fully liquidated; and in case of the death, inability to act, absence or resignation of any one or more of the said commissioners, the other commissioner or commissioners shall act alone.

ARTICLE VII. This act of incorporation may be modified, added to or changed, and this corporation may be dissolved, in the manner set forth in Section Six Hundred and Eighty seven, Revised Statutes of 1870; and the Capital Stock of this Corporation may be increased or diminished by amending the modes now or here after provided by Law.

ARTICLE VIII. No stockholder shall ever be held liable or responsible for contracts or debts of this corporation in any further sum than the unpaid balance due to the Company on the shares owned by him; nor shall any mere informality in the organization have the effect of rendering this Charter null or of exposing any stockholder to any liability beyond the amount which may be due on his stock.

ARTICLE IX. The undersigned organizers of this corporation have respectively subscribed for stock thereon in the names respectively set forth opposite their signatures thereto. Whenever Twenty-five Thousand Dollars of the Capital Stock of this Corporation shall have been subscribed for, it shall be authorized to do business and be considered a going concern. S. A.
