A MYSTERIOUS EXPLOSION.

The Citizens of Marion, Ind., Receive a Severe Shaking Up.

Marion, Ind., January 15—A terrific explosion early this morning shook the city to its foundation, awakened the citizens and caused general consternation. About thirty minutes before a nitro glycerine wagon passed through the city and it is supposed here that the explosive was sent off by a runaway or some similar accident. About a mile from the city is situated a storage house of the Co-operative Torpedo company and it is possible that it was there that the explosion occurred. Telephone messages have been received from many towns in this vicinity showing the shock was felt for many miles.

Gulf Coast Canal.

Congressman Cooper, of this district, recently introduced in congress a bill that will finally result in very much good to this whole section of country, but which at the present time can hardly be hoped for though it may get through the next session of congress.

The bill is nothing more or less than an effort to get a canal cut from New Orleans all along the coast down as far as possible on the Texas coast line.

C. Arthur Williams, the young man who is now doing the Washington end of the Houston Post gives out this morning an interesting interview with Mr. Cooper on the subject and it is reproduced below for what it is worth:

"The proposition," said Mr. Cooper, in discussing the matter "has for its object the opening of a safe water way for vessels of a light draught from the Mississippi river along the gulf coast to the Rio Grande. It developed as proposed it will open one of the grandest arteries of commerce in the South. It will open up for the use about 3,000 miles of waterway that can not now be utilized for profit. It will connect all the gulf coast towns with deep water, utilizing the bays, rivers and bayous in that section. It will open up at a low price the lumber industries, the rice industry and other industries to market now reached at a great cost. It is believed, and this belief is based upon the report of engineers heretofore made, that this canal can be dug from the Mississippi river to the Rio Grande, eighty feet wide and six feet deep for the sum of \$2,000,000 or less. When the canal is completed the boats from the Mississippi and the Ohio rivers and their tributaries can reach all the towns and cities of Western Louisiana and Texas situated on or near the river or in the territory of the state.

It is understood that Representative Broussard introduces a bill next week providing for a survey of the proposed route for the canal along the coast, as Mr. Cooper's bill provides for the survey in Texas. The previous survey spoken of by Mr. Cooper and referred to in his bill was made some time ago and its results were favorable in the main and it is believed that a thorough survey at this time will demonstrate the feasibility of the plan, which will have the united support of the Texas and Louisiana delegation—Beaumont Enterprise.

Savannah, Ga., January 15.—Admiral Schley, accompanied by General W. W. Gordon, visited the Georgia State Agricultural and Mechanical college (colored) today. The college band escorted the visitors to Meldrim auditorium, where the students and many of the representative colored citizens of Savannah had assembled. President B. B. Wright received the admiral and other guests at the entrance to the chapel.

The admiral escorted by President Wright, ascended the rostrum, receiving cheers and applause from the audience.

The students sang "America," concluding with the old plantation melody "Steal Away to Jesus."
