## BOERS APPEAL TO ROSEVELT.

Ask President to Intercede for Life of Commander Kritzing.

New York, Feb. 1.—A special cable from Amsterdam says: Boer delegates, Fischer, Wolverans and Wessels, cabled to President Roosevelt beseeching his intervention to save the life of Commander Kritzing, sentenced to death after his capture by the British.

Although the British authorities have announced that he was executed a week ago, the Boer delegates do not believe he has been killed.

Commandant Kritzing is described as a leader of exceptional ability, and has been repeatedly referred to in dispatches as being hotly pursued, cornered and crushed.

## WILL DEDICATE CHURCHES

United Brethren of Roanoke and Jennings have Completed Places of Worship

The United Brethren of this city will dedicate their new church tomorrow. The new United Brethren church here is the outcome of a work established by the U. B. mission society in the fall of 1897, when Rev. E. J. Church was sent here from Clivinda, Iowa.

Rev. Church went to work at once and succeeded in organizing classes at this place, Roanoke and Evangeline, which points now constitute the Jennings conference of the U. B. church. Later, classes were organized at Glommora and Turkey Creek. The dedication services tomorrow will be conducted by Rev. Wm. Bell of Canton, O. assisted by Elder Mitchell of Kansas.

### Secretary Gage's Farewell.

Washington, Feb. 1.—Secretary Gage's popularity in the social and official life of the national capital was evidenced today by expressions of regret heard on all sides at his leave-taking of office. Heads of departments, senators, representatives and even foreign diplomats were among his callers. Leslie M. Shaw, the new secretary, was at the treasury department, though he will not formally assume the duties of office until Monday.

### Pipe Line Project.

James W. Swayne, of the Hogg-Swayne syndicate of Spindletop assets that his company is going to build a pipe line from the Spindletop field to New Orleans. This will give them entrance to a harbor already well supplied with ships, and will at once give them bottom enough to reach any territory. Mr. Swayne says:

"It is true that a great many people have asserted that a pipe line to New Orleans is impracticable on account of the cheapness of water transportation, but the figures do not prove that such is the case. The chief outlay is the building of the line and the expenses after that are merely nominal. To reach the water transportation you have to build a pipe line to the gulf and after you get there it requires a considerable sum of money to provide ships. The pumping in and out of the ships will equal the reinforcements that would be necessary to drive oil through one continuous line to New Orleans. The cost of a pipe line to New Orleans would not equal the expenditure necessary to build enough ships to take care of the trade and we will have other markets on the line that could not be reached by ships.

"The State of Louisiana is dotted with town and plantations that consume considerable quantities of oil. These places can tap the line and they will be practically as near Spindletop as if they were in their own state.

"For the trade outside of the points where our pipe line will reach we propose to build tank steamers. We do not expect to produce all the oil handled and at least 50 per cent of the oil marketed will be brought from independent companies. Our revenue will be derived almost entirely from pipe line oils."

Rev. H. Happell, of Fondou Lac, Wis., came in on last evening's train and is a guest at the home of Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Haber, on Cary av. Mr. Happell will occupy the pulpit at the Baptist church tomorrow, both morning and evening.
