TERRIFIC FIRES IN THREE CITIES

St. Louis, Patterson, N. J., and Brooklyn Terribly Afflicted.

St. Louis, Feb. 10.—An early morning fire yesterday destroyed the Empire hotel, a large 3 story lodging house at 2700-2702 Olive street, occupied by men exclusively, caused the death of ten men and one woman and dangerously injured eight people. Ten or more who had narrow escapes from death in the fire were more or less injured by being frost bitten. It is estimated that there were between thirty-five and forty persons in the building last night, and it is believed all have been accounted for. It is thought that \$20,000 will cover the damage to the building.

AT PATTERSON, N. J.
Patterson, N. J. Feb. 10.—A great fire swept Paterson yesterday and in its desolate wake are the embers and ashes of property valued in preliminary estimates at \$10,000,000. It burned its way through the business section of the city and claimed as its own a majority of the finer structures devoted to commercial, civic, educational and religious use, as well as scores of houses. There was but small tribute of life and injury to the conflagration, but hundreds were left homeless and thousands with out employment.

AT BROOKLYN.
New York, Feb. 10.—An official estimate of the damage done by the fire which destroyed the plant of the Shadbold Manufacturing company in Brooklyn early yesterday morning fixes the loss at \$300,000. Fourteen people were injured and taken to the hospitals and a number of others were attended by ambulance physicians on the spot.

Calcasieu's Finances.
The finance committee of the police jury of Calcasieu parish, Hon. R. E. Miller, chairman, made an interesting report to the jury yesterday. A careful examination of the financial affairs of the parish, shows that the tax money for the year 1901 amounted in round numbers to \$116,257.90. Deducing from this amount paid for last year's running expenses, and sums paid for back indebtedness, \$107,000, leaves something over \$9,000 balance on hand at the beginning of 1902.—Press.

NEW ORLEANS IN HIGH SPIRITS

The City of Mirth Crowded with visitors to Witness the Sights

New Orleans, Feb. 10.—The week of real merrymaking has arrived and the city is crowded with strangers from all over the country who will vie with the people of New Orleans in getting their fill of mirth and pleasure for the next three days. The city is gayly decorated, business is largely suspended and jollity and enthusiasm are abundant. The booming of cannon shortly after noon today announced the arrival of the royal yacht bearing Rex, king of the carnival, escorted by the royal flotilla, the masts and rigging of all the vessels being gayly decorated with the carnival colors. When the king of the carnival and his retinue had landed, the party escorted by a crack military company proceeded to the city hall and formally received the keys of the city. Tonight the Myrtle Krewe of Proteus gives its grand pageant on the streets, winding up with a tableaux ball at the French opera house.

C., Feb. 10.—St. John's Church was the scene of a notable wedding at noon today when Miss Octavia Macomber Wheaton, daughter of Major General and Mrs. Wheaton, became the bride of Frederick Hitehook Morely, of Colorado Springs. The ceremony was followed by a small reception and breakfast at the home of the bride's parents.
