A SENSATIONAL FRATRICIDE.

A Lady of Prominence Kills Her Son and Then Commits Suicide.

By Union Associated Press. Poughkeepsie, N. Y., April 10.—Mrs. A. Edward Tower, prominent in the better social circles of Poughkeepsie, the wife of a millionaire iron merchant, fired five bullets at her young son, killing him, then suicided with another weapon. She is believed to be insane. The community is excited over the tragedy, owing to the prominence of the parties. There is a possibility of the crimes having been committed by some one else. The case is being investigated, as relatives and friends believe it impossible for the mother to have committed the deed.

In just thirty-five minutes after the fatal drop, the sheriff received a telegram from Gov. Dockery granting a reprieve of fifteen days, in order to investigate the testimony to the effect that Fletcher acted in self defense.

To Educate Orphans.

John McKee, the wealthiest negro in the country, whose will leaves \$2,000,000 to found a national school similar to the Charleston institute here for the education of white and colored male orphans, cuts his daughter's annuity to \$800 per year. He also made provision for the erection of a Catholic church, rectory and convent at McKee City, New Jersey.

IN CONFERENCE.

The Boer and British Leaders Meet on a Good Mission.

By Union Associated Press. Klerksdorp, April 11.—A flag of truce arrived at the British outpost about 11 o'clock this morning with a message stating that Steyn, Dewet and Delarey wished to come in. The officer sent an escort, and about noon the Boer leaders arrived. Representatives of the free state were quartered in the old town, while Delarey, representing the Transvaal, has joined the Transvaal Boers in the new town. Suitable guarded communication was permitted between the two parties. The tent in which the conference will take place is pitched midway between the old and new towns.

AN IMPORTANT GATHERING.

National Meeting That Will be of Much Benefit to the Country.

Indianapolis, Ind., April 11.—No more important gathering of men of business has ever been held in America than that which will assemble in this city next week on the occasion of the annual convention of the National Association of Manufacturers. It promises to be not only the largest assembly of the kind ever held but the most practical. It will be composed of men representing every branch of industry as well as every section of the country. Its main purposes are to develop all American industries to the highest point and to widen the scope of American trade with other nations. The association was organized in Cincinnati in 1895, and its annual conventions have been held in Chicago, Philadelphia, New York, Cincinnati, Boston and Detroit.

Demands His Recall.

Washington, April 11.—It is hinted that super strenuousness on the part of a trusted naval attaché of one of the important foreign legations has caused Secretary Hay to demand his recall on account of his acts as an officer. He is credited with having made expert examination of the fortifications at Egmont Key in the bay of Tampa, Fla. He hired a tug boat and with a sounding line and coast chart, proved to his own satisfaction that it is possible to enter the harbor with torpedo boats, undetected, and approach sufficiently near to destroy the fortifications. As Tampa is a government point for loading transports the investigation is considered nothing but unfriendly.

Sumatra Tobacco Crop.

Special to the Record. Springfield, Mass., April 11.—More than 1000 acres of Sumatra tobacco will be grown under tents in the Connecticut valley this year, as against 47 acres last year, and two or three acres in 1900. Growers expect to receive big prices at the sale of Connecticut valley Sumatra which the department of agriculture will conduct in New York next month.
