THE INSURGENTS ARE ACTIVE

Reported Capture of an American Steam Launch at Bocos del Toro.

New Orleans, April 12.—News reached here in confirmation that an American steam launch has been captured by Colombian insurgents at Bocos del Toro, north of Colon, and one of the American crew killed, his body being thrown overboard. The insurgents escaped with the boat, but a United States cruiser has gone to recover it.
The revolutionists have been planning for months to seize numerous steam launches in the fruit shippers employ, load the barges with troops and move onto Bocos. This is what four thousand insurgents attempted and partially executed. On April 6th men closed the Roubing plantation where the steamer owned by an American firm made fast and captured the boat.

Numerous Fires.

Four stores, two saloons and the new Calumet hotel are in ruins as the result. It is believed the fires were started by anarchists.

SOON TO RETIRE.

The Queen Regent of Spain to retire to Private Life.

Madrid, April 12.—As the young king of Spain will become of age in a little more than a month, people are talking about the prospects and fortune of Queen Christina, the regent. When Marie Christina, a princess imperial and archduchess of Austria, became the bride of Alfonso XII. of Spain, she brought very little dowry indeed to her husband. Nothing was settled upon her except a pension of \$50,000 in the event that she should become the widow of Alfonso XII. As everybody knows, when she did become a widow, the queen declined to receive the pension during the minority of the successor of Alfonso XII. For the first time this year the minister of finance, in his estimate of the budget for 1902, has reminded the nation that the queen will have to receive the part of this pension corresponding to the period extending from May 17 to December 31, namely, a little more than \$81,000.

Singularly enough, the future Queen Dowager Christina will receive annually less than her own daughter, the princess of Austria, who gets \$100,000 a year, and less than her mother-in-law, ex-Queen Isabella II., who gets \$750,000. The king's grand-father, Don Francisco de Asis, husband of Queen Isabella, gets \$60,000, and the Infanta Isabella, aunt of the young king, \$50,000 a year. In fact, in the Spanish royal family at the present time only the king's maiden sister, Princess Maria Teresa, and his aunts, Dona Paz and Dona Eulalia, receive from the Spanish budget less than the regent herself will receive when she hands over the reins of government to her son. It is not generally known abroad that since the war with America the queen regent has managed to make a gift to the nation of \$200,000 out of the \$1,400,000 that forms the civil list of the crown. Fortunately the queen regent has her own little private property in the summer palace of Miramar, in San Sabastian, which she built as soon as she came into a little money left her by one of her Austrian uncles. There, if Alfonso XIII. marries early, and his mother prefers to be independent she may live quietly, facing the sea she loves so well.

SENATOR DEPEW

DON'T WANT IT

In the Course of a Debate He Says He Don't Want to be Re-elected.

Washington, April 12.—Depew's declaration that he will not seek re-election to the United States senate is the talk in town today, coupled with a red-hot passage at arms between Depew and Blackburn of Kentucky, backed by other Southern democrats. The debate was over the election of laws alleged to be a disfranchisement of negroes. His statement on the floor placed New York's younger senator in a more conspicuous light than he is accustomed to. Senator Depew disclaims any personal interest in opposing the election of senators by the people.

THE RICE MARKET.

TALMAGE'S REPORT.

Locally, the month opens at lively gait movement, thus far, being nearly three times corresponding period last year, and every reasonable promise of its continuing at said ratio. As a result, holders are much encouraged and where heretofore any bid received consideration and cost cheerfully accepted. Independence is now manifest and nominally relative figures of primal points insisted upon. The toning up of the latter has undoubtedly contributed a big mite to the changed situation. Going back for resupplies, buyers find that spite reports of "the white man's burden;" an "overwhelming forward supply" in the Southwest, higher prices are demanded; the smaller holders said to be taking the cue from the larger ones in the matter of values. Whatever, the cause, the effect—unification of values—is plainly discernible.

Advices from the South note fair enquiry along the Atlantic coast; prices firmly maintained as the supply is limited and easily placeable in the territory tributary thereto. Then again, Carolina is "a good name to conjure with" and commands relatively higher prices for its product. In New Orleans and the Southwest there is a slight quickening; the movement the largest the past four weeks, although still short of the average of preceding ones. Some complaints are heard of dullness, and yet the sales for the month were up to the similar one 1901; and this, with restricted movement for export and to the extreme west, which chanced at such time last year to be unusually large.

A LABOR GATHERING.

Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel and Tin Workers.

Wheeling, W. Va., April 12.—During the coming week Wheeling will entertain the annual convention of the Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel and Tin Workers, one of the largest and most influential labor organizations in America. There are several things which promise to give unusual importance to the proceedings of the coming convention. The convention will open Tuesday, and according to reports, there will be some opposition to the admission of delegates from some of the new lodges, owing to the fact that the scale rates are not being paid in the mills where they were formed. If the lodges organized in the east are given representation it is said they will be admitted in violation of the constitution, and this will result in the continuation of the present administration.

The rival organization to the Amalgamated Association, recently formed at Chicago, Milwaukee and other points under the name of the Steel Workers Association of America, will probably receive some attention. Notwithstanding the declarations of friendship made by the new organization, it is the general belief that its success cannot but be inimical to the interests of the Amalgamated association.
