BATSON'S TRIAL HAS COMMENCED

The State Puts Coroner
T. H. Watkins on
the Stand.

Lake Charles, April 16.—The trial of A. E. Batson may now be said to be fairly opened. This morning at 8:30 court opened. The jury after resting well last night, took their position in court. Batson was quiet and cheerful. A large crowd was in attendance. Dr. T. H. Watkins, coroner was requested to draw a sketch of the room and place where the bodies were found. He did this on the floor with chalk. The body of Ward Earl was lying on the bed, the others on the floor. The body of L. S. Earle was found three quarters of a mile from the house in a ditch covered with rice straw. A pool of blood was found in the room. He could not say how long a time had elapsed between the time the wounds were inflicted, and was unable to say if the party were all killed at the same time or not.

The next witness was Samuel Blackford. He knew the Earl family 12 years. He last saw them alive in the early part of February. He saw the body of L. S. Earle in the ditch two rods from his house, and saw the others in the house two miles and a half from Welsh. He described the position of the bodies as well as the clothing worn by them. The two witnesses occupied the morning session and court adjourned for dinner.

Two days time was spent in completing the jury in the Batson case, which work was finished at 4:15 last evening. The jury as completed stands as follows: David Marcantel, Jesse Andrews, H. H. Hoag, P. D. Savoie, J. A. Grimaldi, P. W. Oliver, E. H. Green, Jr., Dan Byer, G. W. Elander, J. Alton Foster, D. A. Leveque, Paul Sullivan.

Armenians Massacred.

Constantinople, April 16.—News has been received here of the massacre by Turkish Kurds of 300 Christians at Drolker, Kurdistan. A band of roving Armenians recently appeared near town and the authorities sent Abram Pasha, the head of the Kurdish irregulars to disperse them. The irregulars pushed the Armenians some distance, attacking the Armenian villages en route. Finally the Abram's party was forced back, and just as they reached the town of Sakerg, reinforcements for the Armenians opened fire and a heavy fighting lasted some time. The Kurds enraged at not being able to force the Armenians back turned into the Christian quarter of the town and massacred unmercifully; many Turks were also killed.

A RAILROAD FOR LAKE ARTHUR.

Southern Pacific Company
Now at Work on a
New Line.

The following from the Lake Charles Daily Press shows that the Southern Pacific company is not going to allow any other railroad to head it off:

For several days past a corps of about twenty engineers and their assistants have been surveying and taking levels of the country between Lake Charles and Lake Arthur, thence on east to Gueydan, where connection is made with the Southern Pacific line at Abbeville, and then to New Iberia, where it will connect with the double track to New Orleans. The road will leave the main track east of the city a short distance, in all probability just beyond Kayouche's coulee, and it is thought will connect with the end of the long switch which parallels the road beyond the coal chute here.

This city, Lake Arthur and Abbeville lie on a line almost as straight as the crow flies, while the prosperous little city of Gueydan lies barely to the southward and will be taken in. This shortens the distance to New Orleans and opens up a magnificent territory for Lake Charles.

The road is to be built, in fact is being built now, just as fast as the surveyor's crews leave the route the construction men will take possession, and the former must get out of the way within six weeks.

The close of the year will give us a new route to New Orleans, while still another is on the cards.

BISHOPS MEET.

Representatives of the Episcopal Church in Cincinnati. Special to Record.

Cincinnati, Ohio, April 16.—Sixty of the eighty or more bishops of the Episcopal church, including nearly all the foreign missionary bishops are attending the special meeting of the house of bishops which began here today. The meeting is one of considerable importance to the church. The principal business before the meeting is the election of missionary bishops for western Kansas, the Hawaiian Islands and Porto Rico. Interest centers particularly in the selection of a bishop for Honolulu, where Bishop Nicholas, of California, is now acting pending the selection of a successor to Bishop Willis, who resigned under protest after the see had passed from the control of the British church into American hands. Another matter of importance before the house of bishops is a memorial from the Mexican Episcopal church asking admission into the American church. This matter will be considered but it is not believed that final or definite action will be taken at the present meeting.

Paris, April 16.—One of the most distinguished audiences ever assembled in Paris filled the Theatre comique today on the occasion of the benefit performance for the McKinley memorial fund. Although organized by the American colony of Paris the French government aided the affair with their sanction and Premier Waldeck-Rousseau and other eminent representatives of the government shared the boxes with General Porter and others from the American embassy. More than a score of the most prominent players and singers of Paris contributed their services and it is believed that fully \$100,000 for the memorial fund will be realized by the performance.
