



WEST POINT'S CENTENNIAL.

Uncle Sam's Military Academy Visited by President Roosevelt and Other Distinguished Public Officials.

West Point, N. Y., June 11.—Old soldiers long since retired from active service, soldiers still in their prime and at the head of Uncle Sam's army, and young soldiers who have yet to win their spurs gathered here today and helped to make the centennial celebration of the United States Military Academy the greatest of all days in the annals of the institution. The occasion was inspired also by the presence of the President of the nation, his cabinet members, high officials of the Army and Navy, senators and representatives, foreign diplomats and scores of other persons prominent in official life. But the "old grads" were the particular guests of the day. From every section of the country and from lands far away they came to revisit the scenes of youthful escapades when they received their first military training. One of the most pleasing features of the reunion was the presence of General Simon B. Buckner and one or two others of the handful of surviving Southern generals whose military training was obtained at West Point. Next to the President of the United States these distinguished guests from Dixie land received more attention than did any of the other visitors.

The ceremonies of the day really began with the arrival of the President and his party shortly before ten o'clock, though the formal exercises did not take place until afternoon. With President Roosevelt were Secretary Hay, Secretary Root and other members of his official family, Speaker Henderson of the House of representatives, a number of Senators, the military attaches of the foreign legations in Washington and a number of other specially invited guests. Colonel Albert L. Mills and his staff were present at the station to welcome the head of the nation. With Colonel Mills in full dress uniform were Captain William C. Rivers, Eleventh Cavalry, adjutant of the post; Major Charles B. Hall, Second Infantry, treasurer of the academy; Major John B. Belling, Quartermaster United States Army, quartermaster of the military academy, Captain Malvern H. Barnum, Eighth Cavalry, assistant to quartermaster; First Lieutenant William Kelly, jr., Fourth Cavalry; Major John M. Banister, surgeon, U. S. A., and First Lieutenant Franklin M. Kemp, U. S. A.

Ranged in a precise background of gray and gold was the cadet body. The President was welcomed with military honors. After the formal greetings had been exchanged the procession was formed and marched up the hill toward the West Point plain. The diplomatic visitors were carefully looked after by the various officers of the post. Wu Ting Fang the Chinese minister, was escorted by General Roe, and the Italian Ambassador, the Costa Rican Minister, the Turkish Minister and the Belgian Minister were likewise under escorts of honor. The appearance of President Roosevelt on the plateau upon which the buildings of the post are located was the signal for a salute of twenty one guns from the post battery. The first thing on the program was a review of the cadets. Following the review President Roosevelt and the other great personages were escorted to their quarters. The President was entertained at the sup-

erintendent's quarters and Secretary of War Root. Postmaster General Payne and other cabinet officials were entertained at the officers' quarters. The diplomats and other invited guests were by special arrangement accommodated at the hotel. When the visitors had had time to brush some of the dust of travel from their clothes they assembled at the official residence of Colonel Mills, after a handshaking all around the guests repaired to Memorial Hall and took luncheon in company with the alumni to the academy.

Luncheon concluded, the formal exercises of the day were begun. Guests, alumni and spectators assembled near the superintendent's quarters to escort the President to the hall. The parade was the most imposing event of its kind ever seen at the academy. The post band, in gray trim, headed the line. The corps of cadets came next, and then President Roosevelt and his cabinet officers of the two branches of the services, all in full dress uniform; commanders of the state organizations of National Guard, the governors of several states, college presidents in caps and gowns, and other individuals of importance, with the alumni and army officers of lesser rank.

The line moved around the grassy plain and halted in front of the main entrance to Memorial Hall, where way was made for the President, his Cabinet, the Supreme Court judges and others. The interior of the hall was handsomely decorated with war emblems, the pictures of distinguished graduates of the academy and a lavish display of flags and bunting.

A prayer by the chaplain of the academy and a musical number by the post band served to introduce the program. While the band was playing the President and his Cabinet took seats on the platform, while the other distinguished guests ranged themselves about the spacious hall. Colonel Mills delivered the address of welcome and then introduced President Roosevelt, who made a brief speech that aroused the enthusiasm of the audience to the highest pitch. He reviewed briefly the history and work of the academy and spoke of the important place it occupies in American history and in the hearts and affections of every true citizen of the republic. His words of tribute to the memory of Grant, Sherman, McLellan, Sheridan and other eminent graduates of the academies were greeted with loud applause.

The formal exercises closed with the oration of the day, delivered by General Horse Porter, Ambassador to France. The address was a scholarly effort ringing with patriotism and was listened to with rapt attention by the distinguished audience. At the conclusion of the exercises the distinguished assembly cast aside its dignity and gave vent to its patriotic enthusiasm by loudly singing "America" and other patriotic airs.


