LEGAL LIGHTS MEET.
Lawyers from all over the Country
Meet at Saratoga.

Saratoga, N. Y., August 27.—
When 10.30 o'clock arrived this
morning, the hour appointed for
the opening session of the Amer-
ican Bar Association more than
300 members, representing the
pick and tower of the legal pro-
fession of every section of the
country, sat before the platform
in convention hall when Presi-
dent U. M. Rose, of Little Rock,
Ark., called the gathering to or-
der. The assemblage was com-
posed of men who make, inter-
pret and expound laws, men who
have served their state and nation
on the bench, in the cabinet, and
ambassadors to foreign powers;
men who bear on noble foreheads
and furrowed faces the indelible
marks of intellectuality, and
whose thoughtful glances and
positive speech betoken the
trained mind and judicial temper-
ment. President Rose called to
the rostrum Hon. John C. Car-
lisle, who will deliver the annual
address, and a half dozen other
jurists and members of the bar
of national prominence who were
present.
After expressing appreciation
of Saratoga's welcome to the as-
sociation, President Rose deliv-
ered his annual address, which
was masterly in its logical con-
struction and perspicuous dic-
tion, and which was followed
with the closest attention. His
survey of the recent enactments
of the various states interested
his listeners extremely, and his
learned, yet sometime caustic,
analysis and comments upon sev-
eral important measures seemed
to impress his professional breth-
ren as judicial and comprehen-
sive. It was a long paper, but the
scholarly character of address
and the many sharp comments
that illumined it served to pro-
duce patience and promote good
humor among the listening law-
yers.

CAR SHOPS
AND REFINERY.
Two Big Factories for Jen-
nings Through the Com-
mercial League.
The directors of the Commer-
cial League were "strictly in it" last
night, for the members carried
on their faces a smile that de-
noted extreme happiness, and
carried with it the assurance of
having two new industries in
our midst—namely, the car shops
and also an oil refinery.
The membership committee,
through C. J. Huskey, chairman,
reported twenty-six new mem-
bers and many more promised.
A. C. McMurtrey as chairman
of the municipal committee, stated
that he had called upon the mayor
and informed him regarding the
sidewalks and frame buildings.
The mayor stated that no more
permits will be issued, and that
the buildings now standing will
be removed as soon as possible.
Owners will be given ten days to
put down sidewalks, and if not
complied with the city will build
same and charge it to the prop-
erty owners.
A proposition was received
from E. F. Rowson & Co. to build
a \$50,000 refinery for a donation
of \$1,000 and exemption from
taxation till 1910 was accepted.
A generous offer was received
from E. F. Rowson & Co., donat-
ing fifteen acres of land for the
site for the proposed car shops,
was accepted. This practically
assures both of these big con-
cerns for Jennings. The League's
finance committee has the matter
in hand, and will raise the neces-
sary amount to secure this re-
finery.
Thus, step by step we are con-
tinuing to prosper. We have

ment.

Washington, August 27.—Presi-
dent Roosevelt's speech on
trusts in Providence, R. I., at-
tracted attention here chiefly be-
cause it had been represented
that he would for the present
hold his views in check at the re-
quest of the leaders of his party,
who are seeking to convince him
of the futility of trying to curb
the trusts. His speech shows
that he is going ahead of his
party in this matter as far as it
will permit him to lead it; but
more important than that is the
situation in which it leaves the
republican congressional com-
mittee in the impending cam-
paign.
Representative Babcock, chair-
man of this committee, is reported
to be at his wits end.
Mr. Babcock is already plan-
ning a scare for the benefit of
Wall street. He is saying that
the situation throughout the
country looks bad for republicans
and that hard work will be nec-
essary to save the house. Very
soon he will issue more state-
ments, in which the situation
will be represented as growing
worse. If this does not have the
effect of bringing in the money,
he will probably, as a last resort,
practically concede the election
of a democratic party, unless
the "general apathy" prevalent
in Wall street should disappear.

California Prohibitionists.

The prohibition party in Califor-
nia is holding its state convention
in Los Angeles today with a good
attendance of delegates, particu-
larly from the southern part of
the state. Candidates will be
named for the state offices to be
filled at the approaching election
and plans made for pursuing a
campaign of unusual vigor.

Revolutionize Mining in Alaska.

Seattle, Wash., Aug., 27.—Ma-
chinery which has been taken to
Nome during the last month or
two is expected to revolutionize
both prospecting and the actual
mining of gold on the Bering Sea
coast. Heretofore prospecting
has been done in winter either by
burning or using steam thawers,
which are slow and expensive,
and in summer by cross-cutting
strams. With the machinery
now being introduced it will be
possible to determine the value of
ground within a few days at a
trifling sum, compared with the
present cost. Mining experts
declare that if the machinery now
being introduced had been used
at Nome three seasons ago the
annual output of the district
would now exceed \$25,000,000.
