VIOLENCE IS FEARED

It Will Take the Entire Militia Force to Restore Order.

New York, Aug. 29.—Through-out the financial districts there is a feeling that the strike is nearing its end and that resumption of mining is not far off. This feeling was reflected in the stock market, where the issues reflected in the stock market, where the issues affected by the anthracite strike advanced, Reading leading in the movement.

"Reports we have received from the mining region," said an official, "show that a very large proportion of the men now on strike would be willing to go back to the mines today if they could be afforded ample protection."

"In my opinion, the entire militia of the state of Pennsylvania would be required to give such protection. It would be necessary not only to protect the miners on their way to and from work, but also their homes when they are absent."

Vermont Prepares for President.

Burlington, Vt., Aug. 29.—Burlington is in readiness to extend a fitting welcome to President Roosevelt, who will arrive here tomorrow afternoon. A committee of citizens will meet the presidential party on route and escort them to the city. At the depot the visitor will be received by the municipal officials and a military company, acting as guard of honor, and escorted to the public square where addresses of welcome will be delivered to which President Roosevelt will respond. The President will be entertained at dinner at the residence of ex-Governor Woodbury. Following this function the party will go by steam yacht to Thompson's Point where they will spend the night and part of Sunday as the guest of Secretary Shaw. Returning to this city Monday morning the tour will be resumed through Vermont, the itinerary of the day including Proctor, Rutland, Bellows Falls, Brattleboro and one or two places of smaller size.

Many Swedes Coming Here.

Stockholm, Aug. 29.—Driven from their homes by the unprecedented hard times and the stringent conscription laws in Sweden an unusually large number of Scandinavians are making their way to America this summer. Every steamer leaving for America is crowded, and the transport lines are coping with the greatest rush since the early 80's. Many are unable to obtain passage at Scandinavian ports and are obliged to go to Liverpool and Southampton.

It is estimated that 15,000 passengers for America have left Copenhagen alone during the past six months.

THE CHARTER COMPLETED.

With this new concern, the present ice factories will go out of business ere long, and we will have but one factory, namely the Crystal Ice Company. The capital stock of the company amounts to \$50,000, and the officers are: S. A. Spencer, President. W. C. Lehman, vice president. A. A. Shear, secretary.

The factory will be centrally located and will be modern in all its details, and it is expected to have everything in operation for business by next spring. The machinery has been ordered, and to give the reader an idea of the amount of machinery needed for that concern, we will say that it takes seven freight cars to haul same—no small thing.

With a factory of this kind there is no possibility of running short of ice, and customers can rely upon being kept well supplied with pure, crystal ice.
