SPINDLE TOP HAS A FIRE

Property of Hogg-Swayne Tract Consumed by Flames.

Beaumont, Tex., Oct. 20.—Fire broke out in the northwest corner of block 37 on the Hogg-Swayne tract at 5:40 Sunday morning and destroyed seven standing rigs and two or three derricks before it was extinguished. The conflagration was precipitated by the overturning of a settling tank filled with oil at one of the Georgetown-Waco wells. The oil that was in the settling tank quickly spread to one of the boilers of the Georgetown-Waco company and thence to the highly inflammable derricks and rigs nearby. The Apex Oil company had two wells in the fire, Georgetown-Waco two, Mercantile Company one, Hogg-Swayne Syndicate two, and there were two or three other companies represented that could not be located.

When the tank burned and allowed the oil to run out a young man by the name of February was enveloped in oil and his clothing soon caught fire, and before he could extinguish the flames he was so seriously burned that it is feared he will die.

The sessions will continue several days. The denominational work of the past year will be reviewed and plans for the coming year will be laid for the church and missionary work.

CHARGED WITH MURDER.

Trial Commenced To-Day of an Indiana "Jack the Ripper." Evansville, Ind., Oct. 20.—After many delays the case of Walter S. Sherwell, who is accused of murders of "Jack the Ripper" type, was called for trial today. Sherwell has been in jail nearly a year. He was arrested November 15, last, charged with choking to death Lena Keener and Georgia Halley, whose dead bodies a few nights before had been found in ditches along roads leading into the city. At the time of his arrest Sherwell was a member of the police force. The accused was unable to give bail and has been in jail ever since. The grand jury that convened shortly after the bodies of the two women were found indicted Sherwell for the murder and also the murder of Mrs. Mary Ann Storck. The body of Mrs. Storck was found in almost the identical spot where the body of Mrs. Halley was found. Apparently she had been choked to death. In addition to these three crimes the name of Sherwell was connected with the murder of Fannie Butler, but the grand jury did not indict him for this crime. The body of the Butler woman was found in an alley a year ago last May. From all appearance she had been choked to death in the same manner as had the three other victims. It was ascertained that Sherwell had been talking to the Butler woman on the night she disappeared.

Since his arrest the prisoner has steadily refused to talk about his case beyond asserting his innocence. His wife has stood by him through his trouble, working in a mill to support herself and her two children. Able counsel for the defense has been retained by the mother and sisters of Sherwell, who live at Monroeville, Ohio, and are said to be wealthy. The trial promises to be one of the most notable in the criminal annals of the state.

CONVENTION IN SESSION

Mitchell Urges Acceptance of the Arbitration Proposition

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Oct. 20.—Seven hundred delegates representing the striking miners, went into convention at Nesbitt's theatre to decide whether or not the arbitration proposition shall be accepted and work resumed immediately. President John Mitchell is expected to deliver an address this afternoon. A vote may not be reached until tomorrow. A few local unions are still standing out for concessions but Mitchell's influence is expected to overcome all opposition. Replying to the question concerning the prospect of the convention voting to end the strike, Mitchell said: "I can't say; the matter is in the hands of the delegates. I shall offer the arbitration proposition of President Roosevelt and the delegates must themselves decide when the miners will return to work."

Wilkesbarre, Pa., October 20.—President Mitchell delivered an address urging the delegates to accept the proposed plan of the strike settlement as the best terms offering and out of consideration for the public. Soon after 11 o'clock the convention adjourned until 2 p. m. Secretary Treasurer Wilson thinks the convention will end the trouble and the miners return to work Thursday.


